**BACKGROUND**

The Connecticut Commission on Culture & Tourism (CCT) is seeking proposals from qualified strategic planning consultants or firms to assist CCT in developing a strategic plan that will guide the agency for the next three years (2009-2011). The agency's first strategic plan was submitted to the General Assembly on January 1, 2005, which covers 2005-2008.

**About the Commission**

**Statutory Responsibility**

Connecticut General Statutes Section 10-392 (a) through (b)(5) provide that the Commission on Culture & Tourism shall: (1) market and promote Connecticut as a destination for leisure and business travelers through the development and implementation of a strategic state-wide marketing plan and provision of visitor services to enhance the economic impact of the tourism industry; (2) promote the arts; (3) recognize, protect, preserve and promote historic resources; (4) interpret and present Connecticut's history and culture; and (5) promote Connecticut as a location in which to conduct filming and to establish and conduct business related to the digital media and motion picture industries to enhance these industries' economic impact in the state.

**Mission**

To preserve and promote Connecticut's cultural and tourism assets in order to enhance the quality of life and economic vitality of the state.

**Brief Background**

CCT was formed in 2003 in order for the state's cultural and tourism resources to work more efficiently, productively and creatively. The agency's programs and services emphasize partnership, industry input, economic growth, quality of life, and public benefit. The Commission is committed to developing and sharing expertise in its core disciplines, expanding the capacity of the organizations and individuals it serves, measuring the effectiveness of its programs and ensuring that its services are widely accessible.

The agency is advised by 35 appointed commissioners. CCT operations are organized into four divisions – arts, historic preservation and museums, tourism and film. Combined, CCT provides grants, services, technical assistance, tax credits, regulatory oversight, marketing, promotion, recognition, advocacy and research for the state's culture, tourism and preservation industries.

The agency oversees six welcome centers and four state-owned museums and works with the five tourism regions, the Connecticut Humanities Council and the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation to maximize its impact on the quality of life and the economic vitality of the state.

### **Significant Legislation**

**Public Act 03-6** established the Commission on Culture & Tourism and consolidated the eleven tourism districts into five regional tourism districts.

**Public Act 04-25** requires the Commission to recognize, document and mark sites in Connecticut commemorating the abolition of slavery, the Underground Railroad and the history and movement of African-American residents toward freedom. The Act also requires the Commission to establish a Freedom Trail.

**Public Act 05-288**, *An Act Concerning arm and reservation, and rotection, Affordable ousing and istoric reservation*, requires that a portion of the real property conveyance fee collected by municipalities be distributed to the Commission to support historic preservation activities. In FY 06, the Commission received \$3,448,285.00, and in FY 07, the Commission received \$5,191,375.00. The money has gone to support restoration, improvement, and expansion of structures and landmarks. CCT also used these funds to maintain the 4 historic museums it owns.

**Public Acts 06-186** establish 30% corporation tax credits for movie and digital media production and post production expenses in Connecticut and authorizes the Commission to administer the credits.

During the 2007 session of the General Assembly, several legislative changes were adopted that become effective during 2007 and will have a direct impact on the agency's constituents. The most significant changes were the creation of a \$4 million grant pool for culture, tourism and the arts and several modifications and additions to the recently enacted tax credit programs for film production and digital media.

Other actions included passage of **Public Act 07-250** which adds a second tax credit program for rehabilitating certified historic commercial and industrial properties for residential use to include rehabilitations to certified historic properties for both residential and commercial purposes.

The film production tax credits expanded with the passage of **PA 07-236**, which encourages film and video productions in the state by now explicitly including videos, sound recordings and certain interactive websites as eligible productions. **PA 07-236** also creates a film production infrastructure tax credit, a digital animation tax credit, funding to develop a film industry workforce in the state.

## About CCT's Four Divisions

**The Arts Division** develops and strengthens the arts in Connecticut and makes artistic experiences widely available to residents and visitors. Through its grant programs, the division invests in Connecticut artists and arts organizations and encourages the public's participation as creators, learners, supporters and audience members. The division also administers Connecticut's Art in Public Spaces program that requires that not less than one percent of the cost of construction or renovation of publicly accessible state buildings be allocated for the commission or purchase of artwork for that building. Through its programs and services, the division connects people to the arts and helps to build vital communities across the state.

**The Film Division** promotes Connecticut as a prime location for film, television and media productions. It administers the 30 percent tax credit for productions, infrastructure, and digital animation, provides location services to production companies, and assists the state and its municipalities in coordinating productions. With an on-line Production Guide and extensive location database, along with hands-on technical support, the Film Division serves as a clearing-house for information, incentives, and services that make Connecticut a premier filming venue.

**The Historic Preservation and Museum Division** includes the State Historic Preservation Office which was established under the National Heritage Preservation Act. The HPMD administers a broad range of federal and state programs that identify, register and protect the buildings, sites, structures, districts and objects that comprise Connecticut's cultural heritage. The division is the regulatory authority for the review of both federally and state funded projects to determine the impact on historic resources and may pursue litigation to protect certain historic properties from unreasonable demolition. The division also administers several grant programs for historic preservation, three state tax credit programs for preservation and restoration, the Federal tax credit program, and the Freedom and Rochambeau Trails. The division operates six historic properties: Old New-Gate Prison and Copper Mine; Henry Whitfield State Museum; Sloane-Stanley Museum; Prudence Crandall Museum; Viets Tavern; and, until its anticipated conveyance to the Antiquarian and Landmarks Society, the Amos Bull House.

**The Tourism Division** works to make tourism a leading economic contributor, a compelling reason for visiting the state, and a source of pride for Connecticut residents. The division partners with the Connecticut business community and five tourism regions to position the state, encourage strategic investment, and ensure that Connecticut is a prime destination for leisure and business travelers. A primary strategy for implementing those objectives is the development of a statewide Strategic Marketing plan for tourism which is consumer driven with defined measurable objectives. Tourism offers a broad range of services, including marketing, research, hospitality services, direct sales and business marketing assistance and operates Connecticut's six welcome centers. With the assistance of an outside public relations firm, the division produces the Connecticut *vacation Guide*, the seasonal *Cultural*

*Special Events Guide* and the state's official tourism highway map. The official tourism website is [www.ctvisit.com](http://www.ctvisit.com).

## **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

The Contractor will be expected to provide the following services to the Commission on Culture & Tourism ("CCT"):

### **Consultant Services**

Conduct visioning sessions with planning committee consisting of board, staff, and community leaders to review (a) CCT's mission, vision, core values, and guiding principles laid out in the agency's first 3-year plan from 2005 to 2008; (b) CCT's accomplishments to date; (c) internal and external environment in which CCT operates; (d) new legislation, opportunities, and challenges.

Create a strategic planning roadmap and timeline which must include a broad-based public input process including focus groups, public meetings, citizen interviews as well as interviews with the Governor or her designee(s), legislators and members of CCT's authorizing environment to solicit input and to aid in defining the agency's goals and objectives for the next 3 years.

With assistance and coordination from CCT, implement the public input process; review all findings and discuss their implications and directions/responses with CCT planning committee, board, and staff.

Based on planning committee's recommendations, prepare and release a draft strategic plan to the public for online response and public hearings.

Present strategic plan (incorporating public responses) to CCT board for review and discussion.

Prepare final strategic plan for board approval.

## **CONTRACT PERIOD**

The CCT anticipates that the successful proposer will commence work on or about April 2, 2008.

## **CONTRACTOR QUALIFICATIONS**

Competitive proposers will be those consultants and companies that (1) have a demonstrated track record in strategic planning in one or more of the following: arts, historic preservation, tourism, and film; (2) present a well-thought out approach to the project; (3) designate well-qualified and experienced personnel to the project; and (4) demonstrate commitment to complete the project within CCT's timeframe.

## **SUBMISSION DEADLINE**

The due date for proposals is 12:00 Noon on February 28, 2008. Proposals must be received in the required packaging and labeling at the Commission on Culture & Tourism (An-Ming Truxes), no later than the deadline. Late submissions will not be accepted.

No additions or changes to the original proposal will be allowed after submittal. While changes are not permitted, clarification of proposals may be required by the CCT at the proposer's sole cost and expense.

- B. Proposers Authorized Representative. Proposers must designate an authorized representative and one (1) alternate. Provide the name, title, address, telephone and facsimile numbers, email address for each representative. Such information must be included in the RFP submission.
- C. Communications Notice. All communications with the CCT or any person representing the CCT concerning this RFP are strictly prohibited, except as permitted by the RFP. Any violation of this prohibition by proposers or their representatives may result in disqualification or other sanctions, or both.
- D. Timeline. The following timeline, up to and including the deadline for submitting proposals, shall be changed on by an amendment to this RFP. Dates after the submittal deadline are targets only.

- E. Letter of Intent. No letter of intent is required for this RFP.
- F. Proposers' Conference. There will be no proposers' conference scheduled for this RFP.
- G. Inquiry Procedures. All questions regarding this RFP and submission requirements must be directed, in writing, to the Official State Contact by 3:00 pm, Friday, February 15, 2008. Proposers are required to limit their contact regarding this RFP to the person (s) named herein. Written responses to all questions received will be posted to the State of Connecticut Department of Administrative services website at:

- I. Confidential Information. Proposers are advised not to include in their proposals any proprietary information. The Connecticut Freedom of Information Act generally requires the disclosure of documents in the possession of the State upon request of any citizen, unless the content of the document falls within certain categories of exemption. An example of an exemption is a "trade secret," as defined by statute. If the information is not readily available to the public from other sources and the Proposer submitting the information requests confidentiality, then the information generally is considered to be "given in confidence." Confidential information must be isolated from other material in the proposal and labeled CONFIDENTIAL.
- J. Minimum Submission Requirements. At a minimum proposals must be:
- (1) submitted before the deadline,
  - (2) satisfy the packaging/labeling requirements,
  - (3) follow the required format
  - (4) be complete
  - (5) include all required forms, and
  - (6) be duly executed.
- Proposals that fail to meet these minimum submission requirements may be disqualified and not reviewed further.
- K. Packaging and Labeling Requirements. All proposals must be submitted in sealed envelopes or packages. All proposals must be addressed to the Official CCT Contact. The name and address of the proposer must appear in the upper left hand corner of the envelope or package. An original (clearly identified as such) and

five (5) copies of the proposal must be submitted. The proposal must be signed by the proposer. Unsigned proposals will be rejected.

- L. Proposals Due. An original and five (5) copies as well as an electronic version of proposal in software compatible with Microsoft Word 7.0 must be received no later than 12:00 Noon, on February 28, 2008.
- M. Selection Committee. A Selection Committee comprised of CCT staff or other designees as deemed appropriate will evaluate qualified proposals submitted in response to this RFP and recommend finalists for consideration. The Selection Committee shall evaluate all proposals that meet the Minimum Submission Requirements.
- N. Meetings with Proposers. At its discretion, the CCT may convene meetings with proposers in order to gain a fuller understanding of the proposals. The meetings may involve demonstrations, interviews, presentations or site visits. If the CCT decides that meetings are warranted the Official CCT Contact will contact proposers to make an appointment.
- O. Contractor Selection. It is the CCT's intention to notify the successful proposer by March 20, 2008 and to initiate this engagement as soon possible thereafter.

### **RFP CONDITIONS**

All proposers must be willing to adhere to the following conditions and must positively state this in the proposal:

- A. Contract Compliance Requirements. The State of Connecticut is an Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action employer and does not discriminate in its hiring, employment or business practices. The State is committed to complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and does not discriminate on the basis of disability, in admission to, access to, or operation of its programs, services or activities
- B. All proposals in response to this RFP are to be the sole property of the State. Proposers are **NOT** to include in their proposals any information that is proprietary. All materials associated with this procurement process are subject to the terms of State laws defining freedom of information and privacy and all rules, regulations and interpretations resulting from those laws. The Connecticut Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) generally requires the disclosure of documents in the possession of the State upon request of any citizen, unless the content of the document falls within certain categories of exemption. An example of an exemption is a "trade secret," as defined by Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") §1-210(b)(5)(A). Confidential information must be separated and isolated

from other material in the proposal and labeled **CONFIDENTIAL** and enclosed in a separate envelope.

If the proposer indicates that certain documentation, as required by this RFP, is submitted in confidence by specifically and clearly marking said documentation as CONFIDENTIAL. CCT will endeavor to keep said information confidential to the extent permitted by law. CCT, however, has no obligation to initiate, prosecute or defend any legal proceeding or to seek a protective order or other similar relief to prevent disclosure of any information pursuant to a FOIA requires. As set forth below, the proposer has the burden of establishing the availability of any FOIA exemption in any proceeding where it is an issue. In no event shall CCT or any of its staff have any liability for disclosure of documents or information in the possession of CCT which CCT or such staff believes to be required pursuant to the FOIA or other requirements of law.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** If the information is not readily available to the public from other sources and the proposer submitting the information requests confidentiality, then the information generally is considered to be “given in confidence.” A convincing explanation and rationale sufficient to justify each exemption from release consistent with C.G.S. §1-210(b) shall be prepared by the proposer and accompany the proposal. The rationales and explanation shall be simply stated in terms of the prospective harm to the competitive position of the proposer that would result if the identified information were to be released, and you shall state the reasons why you believe the materials are legally exempt from release pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §1-210(b).

- C. Any product, whether acceptable or unacceptable, developed under a contract awarded as a result of the RFP is to be the sole property of the State.
- D. Timing and sequence of events resulting from this RFP will ultimately be determined by the State.
- E. The proposer’s proposal shall remain valid for a period of 180 days after the closing date for the submission and may be extended beyond that time by mutual agreement.
- F. All proposed costs must be fixed through the period of the agreement. No cost submissions that are contingent on a State action will be accepted.
- G. The State may amend or cancel this RFP, prior to the due date and time, if the State deems it to be necessary, appropriate or otherwise in the best interests of the State. Failure to acknowledge receipt of amendments, in

accordance with the instructions contained in the amendments, may result in a firm's proposal not being considered.

- H. The personnel identified in the proposer's response to this RFP will be the persons actually assigned to the project. Any additions, deletions or changes in personnel from the proposal during the course of the project must be approved by the State, with the exception of personnel who have terminated employment are subject to approval by the State. At its discretion, the State may require the removal and replacement of any of the proposer's personnel who do not perform adequately, regardless of whether they were previously approved by the State.
- I. Any costs and expenses incurred by proposers in preparing or submitting proposals are the sole responsibility of the proposer.
- J. A proposer must be prepared to present evidence of experience, ability, service facilities, and financial standing necessary to satisfactorily meet the requirements set forth or implied in the proposal.
- K. No additions or changes to the original proposal will be allowed after submission. While changes are not permitted, clarification of proposals may be required by the State at the proposer's sole cost and expense.
- L. Proposers may be asked to give demonstrations, interviews, presentations or further explanation to the RFP Selection Committee.
- M. The proposer represents and warrants that the proposal is not made in connection with any other proposer and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. The proposer further warrants that they did not participate in any part of the RFP development process, had no knowledge of the specific contents of the RFP prior to its issuance, and that no agent, representative or employee of the State participated directly in the proposer's proposal preparation.
- N. All responses to the RFP must conform to instruction. Failure to include any required signatures, provide the required number of copies, meet deadlines, answer all questions, follow the required format, or failure to comply with any other requirements of this RFP may be considered appropriate cause for rejection of the response.
- O. The proposer accepts the State's **Standard Contract Language and Compliance Requirements**. (Attached)
- P. The RFP is not an offer and neither this RFP nor any subsequent discussions shall give rise to any commitment on the part of the State or confer any rights on any proposer unless and until a contract is fully

executed by the necessary parties. The contract document will represent the entire agreement between the proposer and the State and will supersede all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, alleged or made, between the parties. The State shall assume no liability for payment of services under the terms of the contract until the successful proposer is notified that the contract has been accepted and approved by the State and by the Attorney General's Office. The contract may be amended only by means of a written instrument signed by the State, the proposer, and the Attorney General's Office.

- Q. Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §4a-81, bids or proposals for state contracts with a value of \$50,000 or more in a calendar or fiscal year, excluding leases and licensing agreements of any value, shall include a **Consulting Agreement Affidavit** (Attached) attesting to whether any consulting agreement has been entered into in connection with the bid or proposal. Such affidavit shall be required if any duties of the consultant included communications concerning business of such State agency, whether or not direct contact with a State agency, State or public official or State employee was expected or made. As used herein "consulting agreement" means any written or oral agreement to retain the services, for a fee, of a consultant for the purposes of (A) providing counsel to a contractor, vendor, consultant or other entity seeking to conduct, or conducting, business with the State, (B) contacting, whether in writing or orally, any executive, judicial or administrative office of the State, including any department, institution, bureau, board, commission, authority, official or employee for the purpose of solicitation, dispute resolution, introduction, requests for information or (C) any other similar activity related to such contract. Consulting agreement does not include any agreements entered into with a consultant who is registered under the provisions of Chapter 10 of the Conn. Gen. Statutes as of the date such affidavit is submitted in accordance with the provisions of Conn. Gen. Stat. §4a-81.
- R. With regard to a State contract as defined in P.A. 07-1 having a value in a calendar year of \$50,000 or more or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more, the authorized signatory to this submission in response to the State's solicitation expressly acknowledges receipt of the State Elections Enforcement Commission's notice advising prospective state contractors of state campaign contribution and solicitation prohibitions, and will inform its principals of the contents of the notice. See Attachment A.

### **REQUIRED FORMAT FOR PROPOSALS**

All proposals must follow the required format and address all requirements listed in the prescribed order using the prescribed numbering system. Failure to follow the required format may result in disqualification of a proposal.

- Font Type: Times New Roman
- Margins: 1” minimum on top, bottom and sides of all pages
- Maximum number of pages: 25 not including Section 1 – Table of Contents and Section 2 – Proposer Information
- **DO NOT** use material dependent on color distinctions, animated electronics, etc. in submissions
- Number of copies: An original and five (5) copies must be received no later than 12:00 Noon on February 28, 2008
- One (1) electronic version. Format: Microsoft Word 7.0 or compatible software

### Section 1 – TABLE OF CONTENTS

Proposers must include a Table of Contents that lists sections and subsections with page numbers that follow the organization and sequence for this proposal as required.

Section 3 – INDIVIDUAL OR ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE

- a. Qualifications. Describe how your experience, education and training, or special knowledge, skills or abilities meet the required minimum qualifications of this RFP.
- b. Summary of Relevant Experience. Provide a listing of projects that the proposer has completed within the last three (3) years in the subject area with emphasis on activities relevant and related to the proposed project. Additionally, please list any contracts in the last three (3) years between the proposer and any agency of the State of Connecticut.
- c. Organization Chart. If proposer is a firm or corporation, provide a diagram showing the hierarchal structure of functions and positions within the organization.
- d. Financial Condition. If the proposer is a firm or corporation, include the two (2) most recent annual financial statements prepared by an independent Certified Public Accountant, and reviewed or audited in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (USA). If a proposer has been in business for less than two years, such proposer must include any financial statements prepared by a Certified Public Accountant, and reviewed or audited in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (USA) for the entire existence of such firm or corporation.
- e. References. Include three (3) letters of reference from recent clients. Provide the following information for each reference: name, title, name of company, company address and telephone number.

Section 4 – STATEMENT OF WORK

- a. Work Plan. Provide a detailed, task oriented breakdown for each activity/task in the Scope of Services. Proposers wishing to add activities/tasks to those specified in the Scope of Services must show the additions as separately numbered activities/tasks.
- b. Methodologies. Describe how each activity/task will be accomplished, providing a detailed explanation of the procedures or processes that will be used to attain the expected outcomes.
- c. Deliverables. List and describe the form and content of each deliverable (outcome). Include a description of the proposed method of working with the State, the resources or services requested of the State (if any), and the proposed method of receiving State approval of deliverables.
- d. Schedule. Include a proposed work schedule, by activity/task, indicated when each activity/task will be accomplished. Identify any significant milestones or deadlines. Include due dates for all deliverables.

Section 5 – PERSONNEL RESOURCES

- a. Staffing Plan – Identify the personnel resources that will be assigned to each activity/task delineated in the work plan above. State the proportion of time that each personnel will allocate to each activity/task of the project. Include a job description for each title assigned to the personnel identified.

- b. Key Personnel. Identify the key personnel that will be assigned to this project. Attach resumes reflecting their qualifications and work experience in the subject area. The CCT must be notified in writing, and in advance, regarding the departure of any key personnel from the project.

Section 6 – PROPOSED COST

Include a cost proposal for the project at an amount not to exceed \$80,000 for the contract term.

Section 7 – CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Include a disclosure statement concerning any current business relationships (within the last three years) that may pose a conflict of interest as defined by Conn. Gen. Stat. Sec. 1-85.

Section 8 – AFFIDAVITS

Submit a **Consulting Agreement Affidavit** if the bid or proposal is for a state contract (only to be used with contracts for the purchase of goods and services) with a value of \$50,000 or more in a calendar or fiscal year, excluding leases and licensing agreements of any value, attesting to whether any consulting agreement has been entered into in connection with the bid or proposal.

Section 9 – ADDITIONAL DATA

Provide any additional information which the proposer wishes to bring to the attention of the State that is relevant to this RFP.

**EVALUATION OF PROPOSALS**

A Selection Committee comprised of State staff or other designees as deemed appropriate will evaluate qualified proposals submitted in response to this RFP and recommend finalists for consideration. The Selection Committee shall evaluate all proposals that meet the Minimum Submission Requirements.

The following criteria shall be utilized in the selection process. They are presented as a guide for the proposer in understanding the State's requirements and expectations for this project and are not necessarily presented in order of importance.

Quality of the firm's experience in strategic planning in one of more of the following: arts, historic preservation, tourism, and film

Qualifications of key personnel

Approach to the project as described in the proposal

Demonstrated commitment to complete the project within CCT's timeframe

## **RIGHTS RESERVED TO THE STATE**

The State reserves the right to award in part, to reject any and all bids in whole or in part for misrepresentation or if the proposer is in default of any prior State contract, or if the bid or proposal limits or modifies any of the terms and conditions and/or specifications of the RFP. The State also reserves the right to waive technical defect, irregularities and omissions if, in its judgment, the best interest of the State will be served.

The State reserves the right to correct inaccurate awards resulting from its clerical errors. This may include, in extreme circumstances, revoking the awarding of a contract already made to a proposer and subsequently awarding the contract to another proposer. Such action on the part of the State shall not constitute a breach of contract on the part of the State since the contract with the initial proposer is deemed to be void ab initio and of no effect as if no contract ever existed between the State and the proposer.

## ATTACHMENT A

### **NOTICE TO EXECUTIVE BRANCH STATE CONTRACTORS AND PROSPECTIVE STATE CONTRACTORS OF CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION AND SOLICITATION BAN**

This notice is provided under the authority of Connecticut General Statutes 9-612(g)(2), as amended by P.A. 07-1, and is for the purpose of informing state contractors and prospective state contractors of the following law (italicized words are defined below):

#### **Campaign Contribution and Solicitation Ban**

*No state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor, with regard to a state contract or state contract solicitation with or from a state agency in the executive branch or a quasi-public agency or a holder, or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or solicit contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, Secretary of the State or State Treasurer, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee;*

In addition, no holder or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or solicit contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of State senator or State representative, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee.

#### **Duty to Inform**

State contractors and prospective state contractors are required to inform their principals of the above prohibitions, as applicable, and the possible penalties and other consequences of any violation thereof.

#### **Penalties for Violations**

Contributions or solicitations of contributions made in violation of the above prohibitions may result in the following civil and criminal penalties:

Civil penalties--\$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contribution, whichever is greater, against a principal or a contractor. Any state contractor or prospective state contractor which fails to make reasonable efforts to comply with the provisions requiring notice to its principals of these prohibitions and the possible consequences of their violations may also be subject to civil penalties of \$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contributions made by their principals.

Criminal penalties—Any knowing and willful violation of the prohibition is a Class D felony, which may subject the violator to imprisonment of not more than 5 years, or \$5000 in fines, or both.

#### **Contract Consequences**

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions may result, in the case of a state contractor, in the contract being voided.

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions, in the case of a prospective state contractor, shall result in the contract described in the state contract solicitation not being awarded to the prospective state contractor, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

The State will not award any other state contract to anyone found in violation of the above prohibitions for a period of one year after the election for which such contribution is made or solicited, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

Definitions:

"State contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that enters into a state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a state contractor until December thirty-first of the year in which such contract terminates. "State contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Prospective state contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, or a proposal in response to a request for proposals by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, until the contract has been entered into, or (ii) holds a valid prequalification certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100. "Prospective state contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor" means (i) any individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in, a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a

business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has *managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract*, (v) the spouse or a *dependent child* who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in this subparagraph, or (vi) a political committee established or controlled by an individual described in this subparagraph or the business entity or nonprofit organization that is the state contractor or prospective state contractor.

"State contract" means an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of fifty thousand dollars or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of one hundred thousand dollars or more in a calendar year, for (i) the rendition of services, (ii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind, (iii) the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work, (iv) the acquisition, sale or lease of any land or building, (v) a licensing arrangement, or (vi) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. "State contract" does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency or any quasi-public agency that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan or a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes.

"State contract solicitation" means a request by a state agency or quasi-public agency, in whatever form issued, including, but not limited to, an invitation to bid, request for proposals, request for information or request for quotes, inviting bids, quotes or other types of submittals, through a competitive procurement process or another process authorized by law waiving competitive procurement.

"Managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract" means having direct, extensive and substantive responsibilities with respect to the negotiation of the state contract and not peripheral, clerical or ministerial responsibilities.

"Dependent child" means a child residing in an individual's household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax of such individual.

"Solicit" means (A) requesting that a contribution be made, (B) participating in any fundraising activities for a candidate committee, exploratory committee, political committee or party committee, including, but not limited to, forwarding tickets to potential contributors, receiving contributions for transmission to any such committee or bundling contributions, (C) serving as chairperson, treasurer or deputy treasurer of any such committee, or (D) establishing a political committee for the sole purpose of soliciting or receiving contributions for any committee. Solicit does not include: (i) making a contribution that is otherwise permitted by Chapter 155 of the Connecticut General Statutes; (ii) informing any person of a position taken by a candidate for public office or a public official, (iii) notifying the person of any activities of, or contact information for, any candidate for public office; or (iv) serving as a member in any party committee or as an officer of such committee that is not otherwise prohibited in this section.

**Purpose of Form**

A person who is required to file an information return with the IRS, must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) to report, for example, income paid to you, real estate transactions, mortgage interest you paid, acquisition or abandonment of secured property, cancellation of debt, or contributions you made to an IRA.

**U.S. person.** Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN to the person requesting it (the requester) and, when applicable, to:

- Certify that the TIN you are giving is correct (or you are waiting for a number to be issued),
- Certify that you are not subject to backup withholding, or
- Claim exemption from backup withholding if you are a U.S. exempt payee.

**Note:** If a requester gives you a form other than Form W-9 to request your TIN, you must use the requester's form if it is substantially similar to this Form W-9.

**Foreign person.** If you are a foreign person, use the appropriate Form W-8 (see **Pub. 515**, Withholding of Tax on Nonresident Aliens and Foreign Entities).

**Nonresident alien who becomes a resident alien.**

Generally, only a nonresident alien individual may use the terms of a tax treaty to reduce or eliminate U.S. tax on certain types of income. However, most tax treaties contain a provision known as a "saving clause." Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the recipient has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

If you are a U.S. resident alien who is relying on an exception contained in the saving clause of a tax treaty to claim an exemption from U.S. tax on certain types of income, you must attach a statement that specifies the following five items:

- The treaty country. Generally, this must be the same treaty under which you claimed exemption from tax as a nonresident alien.
- The treaty article addressing the income.
- The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.
- The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.
- Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article.

**Example.** Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a **nonresident alien or a foreign entity** not subject to backup withholding, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8.

**What is backup withholding?** Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 30% of such payments (29% after December 31, 2003; 28% after December 31, 2005). This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will **not** be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

**Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:**

1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester, or
2. You do not certify your TIN when required (see the Part II instructions on page 4 for details), or
3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN, or
4. The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only), or
5. You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding under 4 above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See the instructions below and the separate **Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9**.

## Penalties

**Failure to furnish TIN.** If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

**Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding.** If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

**Criminal penalty for falsifying information.** Willfully falsifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

**Misuse of TINs.** If the requester discloses or uses TINs in violation of Federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

## Specific Instructions

### Name

If you are an individual, you must generally enter the name shown on your social security card. However, if you have changed your last name, for instance, due to marriage without informing the Social Security Administration of the name change, enter your first name, the last name shown on your social security card, and your new last name.

**Limited liability company (LLC).** If you are a single-member LLC (including a foreign LLC with a domestic owner) that is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner under Treasury regulations section 301.7701-3, **enter the owner's name on the "Name" line.** Enter the LLC's name on the "Business name" line.

**Other entities.** Enter your business name as shown on required Federal tax documents on the "Name" line. This name should match the name shown on the charter or other legal document creating the entity. You may enter any business, trade, or DBA name on the "Business name" line.

**Note:** *You are requested to check the appropriate box for your status (individual/sole proprietor, corporation, etc.).*

### Exempt From Backup Withholding

If you are exempt, enter your name as described above and check the appropriate box for your status, then check the "Exempt from backup withholding" box in the line following the business name, sign and date the form.

Generally, individuals (including sole proprietors) are not exempt from backup withholding. Corporations are exempt from backup withholding for certain payments, such as interest and dividends.

**Note:** *If you are exempt from backup withholding, you should still complete this form to avoid possible erroneous backup withholding.*

**Exempt payees.** Backup withholding is **not required** on any payments made to the following payees:

1. An organization exempt from tax under section 501(a), any IRA, or a custodial account under section 403(b)(7) if the account satisfies the requirements of section 401(f)(2);
2. The United States or any of its agencies or instrumentalities;
3. A state, the District of Columbia, a possession of the United States, or any of their political subdivisions or instrumentalities;
4. A foreign government or any of its political subdivisions, agencies, or instrumentalities; or
5. An international organization or any of its agencies or instrumentalities.

Other payees that **may be exempt** from backup withholding include:

6. A corporation;
7. A foreign central bank of issue;
8. A dealer in securities or commodities required to register in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a possession of the United States;

- 9. A futures commission merchant registered with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission;
- 10. A real estate investment trust;
- 11. An entity registered at all times during the tax year under the Investment Company Act of 1940;
- 12. A common trust fund operated by a bank under section 584(a);
- 13. A financial institution;
- 14. A middleman known in the investment community as a nominee or custodian; or
- 15. A trust exempt from tax under section 664 or described in section 4947.

The chart below shows types of payments that may be exempt from backup withholding. The chart applies to the exempt recipients listed above, 1 through 15.

## **Part 3**

### **CONDITIONS**

#### **1. Entire Agreement**

This Agreement embodies the entire agreement between the State and the Contractor. The parties shall not be bound by or be liable for any statement, representation, promise, inducement or understanding of any kind or nature not set forth herein. This Agreement shall supersede all prior written agreements between the parties and their predecessors. No change, amendments or modifications of any of the terms or conditions of the Agreement shall be valid unless agreed to in writing, signed by both parties and approved by the Attorney General or his Deputy. This agreement shall inure to the benefit of each party's heirs, successors, and assigns.

#### **2. Changes in Services**

When changes in the services are required or requested by the State, Contractor shall estimate promptly any monetary effect and notify the State in writing. State and Contractor will work in good faith to resolve changes in services in a mutually-satisfactory manner. Contractor shall implement no change unless it is approved by the State in writing; and, unless otherwise agreed to in writing, the provisions of this Agreement shall apply to all changes. If the State, in its sole discretion, determines that any change materially affects the cost or time of performance of this Agreement as a whole, the State reserves the right to amend or terminate the Agreement in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.

#### **3. Independent Contractor**

Contractor represents that it is fully experienced and properly qualified to perform the services provided for herein, and that it is properly licensed, equipped, organized and financed to perform such services. Contractor shall act as an independent contractor in performing this Agreement, maintaining complete control over its employees and its subcontractors. Contractor shall perform all services in accordance with acceptable methods, subject to compliance with this Agreement and all applicable laws and regulations. Contractor shall furnish fully qualified personnel to perform the services under this Agreement. It is acknowledged that services rendered by the Contractor to the State hereunder do not in any way conflict with other contractual commitments with or by the Contractor. Contractor agrees that it will not, during the term of this Agreement, enter into any Agreement for services with another State for services substantially similar to those in this Agreement.

#### **4. Notices**

Unless otherwise expressly provided to the contrary, notices provided for hereunder shall be in writing and may be delivered personally or by mail. Notices will be effective if delivered personally or, if by mail, upon receipt, to the following addresses:

The parties may change their respective addresses for notices under this paragraph 4 upon prior written notification to the other.

## **5. Laws and Regulations**

The parties agree that this agreement will be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of Connecticut.

## **6. Labor and Personnel**

Contractor shall utilize approved, qualified personnel and any State approved subcontractor necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.

Contractor shall advise the State promptly, in writing, of all labor disputes or anticipated labor disputes or other labor related occurrences known to Contractor involving Contractor's employees' performance or subcontractor's performance which may reasonably be expected to affect Contractor's performance of services under this Agreement. The State may, at its option, require Contractor to arrange for a temporary employee(s) or subcontractor(s) satisfactory to the State to provide the services otherwise performable by Contractor hereunder. Contractor will be responsible to the State for any economic detriment caused the State by such subcontract arrangement.

Contractor shall, if requested to do so by the State, reassign from the State's account any employee, subcontractor, or authorized representatives whom the State, in its sole discretion, determines is incompetent, dishonest, uncooperative, or unsuitable. In requesting the reassignment of an employee under this paragraph, the State shall give thirty-day (30) notice to Contractor of the State's desire for such reassignment. Contractor will then have fifteen (15) days to investigate such request and submit its findings to the State. After reviewing such findings, the State, at its sole discretion, may still require that Contractor reassign the employee, subcontractor, or authorized

representative. Such reassignment shall occur by the thirtieth (30) day following the notice of requested reassignment.

## **7. Conflicts, Error, Omissions and Discrepancies**

In case of conflicts, discrepancies, error or omissions among the various parts of this Agreement, any such matter shall be submitted immediately by Contractor to the State for clarification. The State shall issue such clarification within a reasonable period of time. Any services affected by such conflicts, discrepancies, error or omissions which are performed by Contractor prior to clarification by the State shall be at Contractor's risk.

## **8. Indemnity**

- (a) The Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State and its officers, representatives, agents, servants, employees, successors and assigns from and against any and all (1) Claims arising, directly or indirectly, in connection with the Agreement, including the acts of commission or omission (collectively, the "Acts") of the Contractor; and (2) liabilities, damages, losses, costs and expenses, including but not limited to, attorneys' and other professionals' fees, arising, directly or indirectly, in connection with Claims, Acts or the Agreement. The Contractor shall use counsel reasonably acceptable to the State in carrying out its obligations under this section. The Contractor's obligations under this section to indemnify, defend and hold harmless against Claims includes Claims concerning confidentiality of any part of or all of the Bid or any Records, any intellectual property rights, other proprietary rights of any person or entity, copyrighted or uncopyrighted compositions, secret processes, patented or unpatented inventions, articles or appliances furnished or used in the Performance of the Agreement.
- (b) The Contractor shall reimburse the State for any and all damages to the real or personal property of the State caused by the Acts of the Contractor or any Contractor Parties. The State shall give the Contractor reasonable notice of any such Claims.
- (c) The Contractor's duties under this section shall remain fully in effect and binding in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agreement, without being lessened or compromised in any way, even where the Contractor is alleged or is found to have merely contributed in part to the Acts giving rise to the Claims and/or where the State is alleged or is found to have contributed to the Acts giving rise to the Claims.
- (d) The Contractor shall carry and maintain at all times during the term of the Agreement, and during the time that any provisions survive the term of the Agreement, sufficient general liability insurance to satisfy its obligations under this Agreement. The Contractor shall name the State as an additional insured on the policy and shall provide a copy of the policy to the Agency prior to the effective date of the Agreement. The Contractor shall not begin Performance until the delivery of the policy to the Agency.
- (e) The rights provided in this section for the benefit of the State shall encompass the recovery of attorneys' and other professionals' fees expended in pursuing a Claim against a third party.

This section shall survive the Termination, Cancellation or Expiration of the Agreement, and shall not be limited by reason of any insurance coverage.

## **9. Nondisclosure**

Contractor shall not release any information concerning the services provided pursuant to this Agreement or any part thereof to any member of the public, press, business entity or official body unless prior written consent is obtained from the State.

## **10. Quality Surveillance**

All services performed by Contractor shall be subject to the inspection and approval of the State at all times, and Contractor shall furnish all information concerning the services and grant the State's duly authorized representatives free access at all reasonable times upon 24-hour notice to Contractor's facilities where the services under the Agreement are performed or where the books and records relative to such services are maintained, and shall allow such representatives free access to any and all such books and records. At the State's request, the Contractor shall provide the State with hard copies and digital files containing any data or information in the possession of the Contractor, which pertain to the State's business under this Agreement.

## **11. Non-Waiver**

None of the conditions of this Agreement shall be considered waived by the State or the Contractor unless given in writing. No such waiver shall be a waiver of any past or future Agreement, and no waiver shall constitute a default, breach or modification of any of the conditions of this Agreement unless expressly stipulated in such waiver.

## **12. Examination of Contractor's Records**

The State or its representatives shall have the right at reasonable hours to examine any books, records and other documents of Contractor or its subcontractor pertaining to work performed under this Agreement. The State will give Contractor or such subcontractor 24-hour notice of such intended examination. At the State's request, the Contractor shall provide the State with hard copies and digital files containing any data or information relating to the State's business, which data or information is in the possession or control of the Contractor. The Contractor shall incorporate this paragraph 12 verbatim into any agreement it enters into with any subcontractor providing services under this Agreement.

## **13. Promotion**

Unless specifically authorized in writing by the Executive Director of the Connecticut Commission Culture and Tourism on a case by case basis, Contractor shall have no right

to use, and shall not use, the name of the State of Connecticut, its officials or employees, or seal of the State:

in any advertising, publicity, promotion; or to express or to imply any endorsement of Contractor's products or services; or

to use the names of the State, its officials or employees or the State Seal in any manner (whether or not similar to uses prohibited by subparagraphs (a) and (b) above), except only to manufacture and deliver in accordance with this Agreement such items as are hereby contracted for by the State.

## **14. Survival**

The rights and obligations of the parties, which by their nature survive termination or completion of this Agreement, including but not limited to those set forth herein in Part 1, Sections 8, 9, 13 and 15 of this Agreement, shall remain in full force and effect.

## **15. Confidentiality**

All data provided to Contractor by the State or developed internally by Contractor with regard to the State is proprietary to the State and confidential unless the State agrees in writing to the contrary. Contractor agrees to forever hold in confidence all files, records, documents or other information as designated, whether prepared by the State or others, which may come into Contractor's possession during the term of this Agreement, except where a disclosure of such information by Contractor is required by other governmental authority to ensure compliance with the laws, rules or regulations, and such disclosure will be limited to that actually so required. Where such disclosure is required, Contractor will provide advance notice to the State of the need for the disclosure and will not disclose absent consent from the State.

## **16. Non-Discrimination**

Non-discrimination. References in this section to "contract" shall mean this Agreement and references to "contractor" shall mean the Contractor.

(a) The following subsections are set forth here as required by section 4a-60 of the Connecticut General Statutes:

(1) The contractor agrees and warrants that in the performance of the contract such contractor will not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of race, color, religious creed, age, marital status, national origin, ancestry, sex, mental retardation or physical disability, including, but not limited to, blindness, unless it is shown by such contractor that such disability prevents performance of the work involved, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the state of Connecticut. The contractor further agrees to take affirmative action to insure that applicants with job-related qualifications are employed and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their race, color, religious creed, age, marital status,

- national origin, ancestry, sex, mental retardation, or physical disability, including, but not limited to, blindness, unless it is shown by such contractor that such disability prevents performance of the work involved; (2) the contractor agrees, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, to state that it is an "affirmative action-equal opportunity employer" in accordance with regulations adopted by the commission; (3) the contractor agrees to provide each labor union or representative of workers with which such contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding and each vendor with which such contractor has a contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the commission advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section, and to post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment; (4) the contractor agrees to comply with each provision of this section and sections 46a-68e and 46a-68f and with each regulation or relevant order issued by said commission pursuant to sections 46a-56, 46a-68e and 46a-68f; (5) the contractor agrees to provide the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities with such information requested by the commission, and permit access to pertinent books, records and accounts, concerning the employment practices and procedures of the contractor as relate to the provisions of this section and section 46a-56.
- (b) If the contract is a public works contract, the contractor agrees and warrants that he will make good faith efforts to employ minority business enterprises as subcontractors and suppliers of materials on such public works project.
- (c) "Minority business enterprise" means any small contractor or supplier of materials fifty-one per cent or more of the capital stock, if any, or assets of which is owned by a person or persons: (1) Who are active in the daily affairs of the enterprise, (2) who have the power to direct the management and policies of the enterprise and (3) who are members of a minority, as such term is defined in subsection (a) of section 32-9n; and "good faith" means that degree of diligence which a reasonable person would exercise in the performance of legal duties and obligations. "Good faith efforts" shall include, but not be limited to, those reasonable initial efforts necessary to comply with statutory or regulatory requirements and additional or substituted efforts when it is determined that such initial efforts will not be sufficient to comply with such requirements.
- (d) Determination of the contractor's good faith efforts shall include but shall not be limited to the following factors: The contractor's employment and subcontracting policies, patterns and practices; affirmative advertising, recruitment and training; technical assistance activities and such other reasonable activities or efforts as the commission may prescribe that are designed to ensure the participation of minority business enterprises in public works projects.
- (e) The contractor shall develop and maintain adequate documentation, in a manner prescribed by the commission, of its good faith efforts.
- (f) The contractor shall include the provisions of section A above in every subcontract or purchase order entered into in order to fulfill any obligation of a contract with the state and such provisions shall be binding on a subcontractor, vendor or manufacturer unless exempted by regulations or orders of the commission. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any such subcontract or purchase order as the commission may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance in accordance with section 46a-56; provided, if such contractor

becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the commission, the contractor may request the state of Connecticut to enter into any such litigation or negotiation prior thereto to protect the interests of the state and the state may so enter.

(g) The following subsections are set forth here as required by section 4a-60a of the Connecticut General Statutes:

- (1) The contractor agrees and warrants that in the performance of the contract such contractor will not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of sexual orientation, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the state of Connecticut, and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their sexual orientation;
- (2) the contractor agrees to provide each labor union or representative of workers with which such contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding and each vendor with which such contractor has a contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section, and to post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment;
- (3) the contractor agrees to comply with each provision of this section and with each regulation or relevant order issued by said commission pursuant to section 46a-56;
- (4) the contractor agrees to provide the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities with such information requested by the commission, and permit access to pertinent books, records and accounts, concerning the employment practices and procedures of the contractor which relate to the provisions of this section and section 46a-56.

The contractor shall include the provisions of section G above in every subcontract or purchase order entered into in order to fulfill any obligation of a contract with the state and such provisions shall be binding on a subcontractor, vendor or manufacturer unless exempted by regulations or orders of the commission. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any such subcontract or purchase order as the commission may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance in accordance with section 46a-56; provided, if such contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the commission, the contractor may request the state of Connecticut to enter into any such litigation or negotiation prior thereto to protect the interests of the state and the state may so enter.

## **17. Sovereign Immunity/Claims**

It is agreed and understood that the State of Connecticut shall not be construed to have waived any rights or defenses of sovereign immunity which it may have with respect to all matters arising out of this Agreement.

The Contractor agree that the sole and exclusive means for the presentation of any claim against the State arising from this Agreement shall be in accordance with Chapter 53 of the Connecticut General Statutes (Claims Against the State) and the Contractor further

agrees not to initiate legal proceedings except as authorizes by that Chapter in any State or Federal court in addition to or in lieu of said Chapter 53 proceedings.

## 18. Termination

Termination, Cancellation and Expiration.

- (a) Notwithstanding any provisions in this Agreement, the Agency, through a duly authorized employee, may Terminate the Agreement whenever the Agency makes a written determination that such Termination is in the best interests of the State. The Agency shall notify the Contractor in writing of Termination pursuant to this section, which notice shall specify the effective date of Termination and the extent to which the Contractor must complete Performance under the Agreement prior to such date.
- (b) Notwithstanding any provisions in this Agreement, the Agency, through a duly authorized employee, may, after making a written determination that the Contractor has breached the Agreement, Cancel the Agreement in accordance with the provisions in the Breach section of this Agreement.
- (c) The Agency shall send the notice of Termination or Cancellation via certified mail, return receipt requested, to the Contractor at the most current address which the Contractor has furnished to the Agency for purposes of correspondence, or by hand delivery. Upon receiving such notice from the Agency, the Contractor shall immediately discontinue all services affected in accordance with the notice, undertake all commercially reasonable efforts to mitigate any losses or damages, and deliver to the Agency all Records. The Records are deemed to be the property of the Agency and the Contractor shall deliver them to the Agency no later than thirty (30) days after the Termination, Cancellation or Expiration of the Agreement or fifteen (15) days after the Contractor receives a written request from the Agency for the Records. The Contractor shall deliver those Records that exist in electronic, magnetic or other intangible form in a non-proprietary format, such as, but not limited to, ASCII or .TXT.
- (d) Upon receipt of a written notice of Termination or Cancellation from the Agency, the Contractor shall cease operations as directed by the Agency in the notice, and take all actions that are necessary or appropriate, or that the Agency may reasonably direct, for the protection and preservation of the Goods and any other property. Except for any work which the Agency directs the Contractor to Perform in the notice prior to the effective date of Termination or Cancellation, and except as otherwise provided in the notice, the Contractor shall terminate or conclude all existing subcontracts and purchase orders and shall not enter into any further subcontracts, purchase orders or commitments.
- (e) In the case of any Termination or Cancellation, the Agency shall, within forty-five (45) days of the effective date of Termination or Cancellation, reimburse the Contractor for its Performance rendered and accepted by the Agency in accordance with Exhibit A, in addition to all actual and reasonable costs incurred after Termination or Cancellation in completing those portions of the Performance which the Contractor was required to complete by the notice. However, the Contractor is not entitled to receive and the Agency is not obligated to tender to the Contractor any payments for anticipated or lost profits. Upon request by the Agency, the Contractor shall assign to the Agency, or any replacement contractor which the Agency

designates, all subcontracts, purchase orders and other commitments, deliver to the Agency all Records and other information pertaining to its Performance, and remove from State premises, whether leased or owned, all such equipment, waste material and rubbish related to its Performance as the Agency may request.

- (f) For breach or violation of any of the provisions in the section concerning Representations and Warranties, the Agency may Cancel the Agreement in accordance with its terms and revoke any consents to assignments given as if the assignments had never been requested or consented to, without liability to the Contractor or Contractor Parties or any third party.
- (g) Upon Termination, Cancellation or Expiration of the Agreement, all rights and obligations shall be null and void, so that no party shall have any further rights or obligations to any other party, except with respect to the sections which survive Termination, Cancellation or Expiration of the Agreement. All representations, warranties, agreements and rights of the parties under the Agreement shall survive such Termination, Cancellation or Expiration to the extent not otherwise limited in the Agreement and without each one of them having to be specifically mentioned in the Agreement.
- (h) Termination or Cancellation of the Agreement pursuant to this section shall not be deemed to be a breach of contract by the Agency.

## **19. Terms**

Wherever the term “Commissioner” is used in this Agreement it shall mean the Executive Director, Connecticut Commission on Culture and Tourism or his/her authorized agent, employee or designee.

## **20. Assignment**

This agreement shall not be assigned by either party without the written consent of the other.

## **21. Severability**

If any part or parts of this Agreement shall be held to be void or unenforceable, such part or parts shall be treated as severable, leaving valid the remainder of this Agreement notwithstanding the part or parts found to be void or unenforceable.

## **22. Subpoenas**

In the event the State’s records are subpoenaed pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. section 36a-43, the Contractor shall, within twenty-four (24) hours of service of the subpoena, notify the person designated for the State in Section 4 of part 1 of this Agreement of such subpoena. Within thirty-six (36) hours of service, the Contractor shall send a written

notice of the subpoenas together with a copy of the same to the person designated for the State in Section #4 of Part 1 of this Agreement.

### **23. Executive Orders**

Executive Orders. The Contract is subject to the provisions of Executive Order No. Three of Governor Thomas J. Meskill, promulgated June 16, 1971, concerning labor employment practices, Executive Order No. Seventeen of Governor Thomas J. Meskill, promulgated February 15, 1973, concerning the listing of employment openings and Executive Order No. Sixteen of Governor John G. Rowland promulgated August 4, 1999, concerning violence in the workplace, all of which are incorporated into and are made a part of the Contract as if they had been fully set forth in it. At the Contractor's request, the Client Agency shall provide a copy of these orders to the Contractor. The Contract may also be subject to Executive Order No. 7C of Governor M. Jodi Rell, promulgated July 13, 2006, concerning contracting reforms and Executive Order No. 14 of Governor M. Jodi Rell, promulgated April 17, 2006, concerning procurement of cleaning products and services, in accordance with their respective terms and conditions.

### **24. Summary of Ethics Laws**

Pursuant to the requirements of section 1-101qq of the Connecticut General Statutes, the summary of State ethics laws developed by the State Ethics Commission pursuant to section 1-81b of the Connecticut General Statutes is incorporated by reference into and made a part of the Contract as if the summary had been fully set forth in the Contract.

### **25. Campaign Contribution Restriction**

For all State contracts as defined in P.A. 07-1 having a value in a calendar year of \$50,000 or more or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more, the authorized signatory to this Agreement expressly acknowledges receipt of the State Elections Enforcement Commission's notice advising state contractors of state campaign contribution and solicitation prohibitions, and will inform its principals of the contents of the notice. #### **NOTICE TO EXECUTIVE BRANCH STATE CONTRACTORS AND PROSPECTIVE STATE CONTRACTORS OF CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION AND SOLICITATION BAN**

This notice is provided under the authority of Connecticut General Statutes 9-612(g)(2), as amended by P.A. 07-1, and is for the purpose of informing state contractors and prospective state contractors of the following law (italicized words are defined below):

#### Campaign Contribution and Solicitation Ban

*No state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor, with regard to a state contract or state contract solicitation with or from a state agency in the executive branch or a quasi-public*

agency or a holder, or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or *solicit* contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, Secretary of the State or State Treasurer, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee; In addition, no holder or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or solicit contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of State senator or State representative, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee.

#### Duty to Inform

State contractors and prospective state contractors are required to inform their principals of the above prohibitions, as applicable, and the possible penalties and other consequences of any violation thereof.

#### Penalties for Violations

Contributions or solicitations of contributions made in violation of the above prohibitions may result in the following civil and criminal penalties:

Civil penalties--\$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contribution, whichever is greater, against a principal or a contractor. Any state contractor or prospective state contractor which fails to make reasonable efforts to comply with the provisions requiring notice to its principals of these prohibitions and the possible consequences of their violations may also be subject to civil penalties of \$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contributions made by their principals.

Criminal penalties—Any knowing and willful violation of the prohibition is a Class D felony, which may subject the violator to imprisonment of not more than 5 years, or \$5000 in fines, or both.

#### Contract Consequences

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions may result, in the case of a state contractor, in the contract being voided.

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions, in the case of a prospective state contractor, shall result in the contract described in the state contract solicitation not being awarded to the prospective state contractor, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

The State will not award any other state contract to anyone found in violation of the above prohibitions for a period of one year after the election for which such contribution is made or solicited, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.
