## A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR OF TRAINING



Effective July 1, 2011, the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control – Connecticut Fire Academy has been consolidated with the newly-created Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection under the leadership of Commissioner Reuben Bradford. The Commission is now a Division within the new agency, alongside the Divisions of State Police; Fire Investigations and Emergency Telecommunications; Scientific Services; Emergency Management and Homeland Security and Police Officer Standards and Training.

We trust that the training opportunities contained within our 2012 Training Calendar will meet with your expectations.

Our goal is to provide resources and certification programs that fire service members need to maintain the highest professional skill standards. The Connecticut Fire Academy provides basic, leadership and technical specialty training on-campus and throughout the state.

Please excuse our on-campus construction as Hartford County Regional Fire School is expanding into a new four bay fire station and a separate Class A burn building. Thanks to capital funds allocated by the General Assembly (state legislature) a state of the art classroom should be available to Hartford County Regional Fire School students by July 1, 2012. The new 4,864 square foot burn building contains multiple firefighting scenarios from garage fires to chimney fires including a balloon frame construction section with fire spread between floors. The structure is three stories in the rear (walkout basement) and two stories in the front yielding many positions and opportunities to practice flat and pitched roof venting, elevated window ingress and rescue practice. The burn building has pyrometers to measure both ambient and set-fire room heat plus the maximum heat measured behind the thermal lining system in order to insure long term structure integrity. We are collectively excited to be able to bring you new experiences and challenges that will hone your abilities to perform at an emergency scene.

Several CFA courses are being revised to current National Fire Protection Association standards. Please watch for flyers and/or our website postings at [www.ct.gov/cfpc](http://www.ct.gov/cfpc) regarding revised class content. Some new deliveries are: Strategy and Tactics I: Fundamentals, and Strategy and Tactics II: Common Everyday Emergencies and Service Calls.

## CONNECTICUT FALLEN FIREFIGHTERS MEMORIAL



incorporating a plaza-like setting, featuring a brick patio in the form of the Maltese Cross, the universal symbol of the fire service. The centerpiece of the Memorial is a six foot by twelve foot polished impala black granite stone bearing the likeness of four firefighters fighting a blaze; Lieutenant Paul Walsh of the New Britain Fire Department designed the artist's rendition of the firefighters. The centerpiece rests upon a base of concrete and gray granite to which are affixed plaques with the engraved names of those who have lost their lives. The plaques are numbered with roman numerals to ease the task of locating names. Atop the base, in front of the centerpiece is an eternal flame to acknowledge and honor this group of brave and noble firefighters. Surrounding the centerpiece are eight granite sitting benches representing the eight counties in Connecticut.

On September 25, 2011, the Memorial site saw the addition of a steel artifact from the World Trade Center. The nearly twelve foot tall beam weighing 1200 pounds is a lasting memorial to the 343 FDNY firefighters, other first responders and civilians who perished as a result of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001.

The Memorial Site is accessible 24 hours a day for the public to pay tribute to Connecticut's Bravest.

Located on the grounds of the Connecticut Fire Academy in Windsor Locks, stands the Connecticut Firefighters Memorial dedicated to Connecticut Firefighters who have lost their lives in the line of duty.

The Memorial was first envisioned in 1992 with the establishment of a Memorial Committee by the Connecticut State Firefighters Association. A ground

breaking was held on June 12, 2001. The Memorial is the first of its kind in the state honoring Connecticut Firefighters who gave the ultimate sacrifice with more than 300 names engraved in the granite panels that surround the Memorial.

The design of the Memorial was conceived by the Connecticut Firefighters Memorial Committee

## APPARATUS PROGRAMS

### Aerial Operator

This six-day course meets NFPA Standard 1002 for the driver/operator section, which addresses aerial devices.

Instruction will be given on: aerial, tower ladders and articulating booms. Course content will prepare the student for the practical and written examinations for Aerial Operator certification. This course is designed for the driver/operator of aerial equipment. The course begins with road handling and moves on to apparatus placement, mobilization and stabilization, elevation, various aerial operations and apparatus readiness. It is required that each student has access to the manufacturer's reference manual for their department aerial device. This course alone is not designed to produce expert aerial operators. Students must apply the basics learned from this course with continued hands-on practical applications with apparatus in their department to build and maintain proficiency in aerial apparatus operations.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: IFSTA Aerial Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook, 2nd Edition

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I, or member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977 and legally licensed to drive emergency apparatus. Proof must be submitted with the application. Candidates for certification to this level must be in possession of a Connecticut Driver's license with a "Q" Endorsement, a Class A or B Commercial Driver's license (CDL) or shall provide proof that the Driving/Operating requirements of NFPA Standard 1002, Chapter 4, have been satisfactorily completed.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

### Aerial Strategies and Tactics

This course will cover, in detail, general aerial safety issues, rescue priorities, ventilation operations, elevated master streams and general aerial use in both emergency and non-emergency situations. Topics include: basic tactical options for aerial use and limitations, apparatus placement, stabilization systems, and elevation. Students will review the major responsibilities of an aerial apparatus operator including; positioning, spotting, and

staging apparatus for incident operations.

Hands-on exercises will reinforce recommended safe practices in the areas of raising, rotating and extending an aerial device, ladder tip placement for various situations and operating aerial master streams.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; or have been a member of a Fire Department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 16                      Course Fee: \$90.00

### Basic Pump Operation

This course examines the components and controls used in the operation of a fire pump. The internal parts of a fire pump are examined with the goal of having the student fully understand how the fire pump moves water. Pump panel controls are discussed in relation to the specific function and use of each device. The process and specific functions involved in drafting and hydrant operations are explained in detail. Students will practice setting up for pumping operations. Participants will learn how to determine and overcome friction loss, how to calculate theoretical pump pressure and how to apply easy-to-use "rule of thumb" principles of relay pumping, operating handlines, supplying sprinklers and standpipe systems. On the training ground each student will apply practical applications while flowing water at prescribed pressures.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; or have been a member of a Fire Department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the application.

### Pump Operator

This course is designed to prepare the student for the practical skills and written examinations for Pump Operator certification. Class work will include: safe driving techniques, preventive maintenance, pump operations, hydraulic calculations, water supply and apparatus systems. The course begins inside the classroom and ends outside with pumping apparatus. The main emphasis is on "hands-on" exercises using various types of pumps, hose sizes and nozzles. This course alone is not designed to produce expert pump operators. Students must apply the basics learned from this course with continued hands-on practical applications with apparatus in their departments to build and maintain proficiency in pump apparatus operations.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: IFSTA Pumping Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook, 2nd Edition; and the IFSTA Pumping Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook Study Guide.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Certified Firefighter I or a member

of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977, candidates for certification to this level must be in possession of a Connecticut Driver's License with a "Q" endorsement, a Class A or B Commercial Driver's License (CDL) or shall provide proof that the Driving/Operating requirements of NFPA Standard 1002, Chapter 4, have been satisfactorily completed.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

### Q Endorsement

The Q Endorsement course is designed to prepare the potential fire apparatus operator for the testing requirements established by the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles. This training course will consist of classroom and extensive practical sessions conducted throughout the length of the course culminating with practical testing administered by the Department of Motor Vehicle on the final day of the class. Students should make arrangements to practice pre-trip and driving skills at their own firehouse during non-class hours to be more successful with the DMV administered test.

Topics covered in the classroom portion of the course include: testing requirements; inspection methods; speed and braking distances; night driving; driving and alcohol; emergencies; accidents; and air brakes. Topics covered in the practical portion of the course include: pre-trip inspection; static course; and over the road skills.

Training Prerequisites: Applicants must possess a valid operator's license. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 32                      Course Fee: \$300.00

### Tanker Shuttle Operations

This class is designed to make the student aware of the importance of pre-planning water sources and operations for rural water supply tanker transfers prior to the need arising. This course covers the following components: safe tanker operations, driving, filling and dumping; compare and contrast tanker design and efficiency; recognizing proper water sources; evaluating and developing proper dump sites; and organizing mutual aid for tanker task force concepts.

These components are met through the following course goals and objectives: identify apparatus requirements for a water shuttle; identify the requirements for setting up a shuttle operation; describe fill and dump site operations for a water shuttle; describe how to evaluate tanker performance; and demonstrate tanker operation in practical evolutions. On the final day of class students will incorporate information given and resources provided to supply a continuous 750 gallon per minute flow rate of water for a minimum of two hours. Successful application of the course information may lead to the enhancement of the ISO rating for your community. Completion of this course allows for student to apply for "Tanker Operator" Certification if currently a certified as a pump operator.

PPE Requirements: Full protective clothing (no SCBA)

Training Prerequisite: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Certification Prerequisite: Certified Pump Operator; proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 16

### Emergency Medical Technician Refresher EMT-R

This course reviews and refreshes knowledge and skills required for Emergency Medical Technicians currently certified according to the latest U.S. DOT EMT-Basic National Standard Curriculum. Classroom and "hands-on" training will update the EMT on current practices and confirm skill levels. A review and renewal of Healthcare Provider CPR will be conducted in conformance with the latest JAMA standards through approved programs of the American Heart Association. Written and practical examinations will be conducted in conformance with the policies established by the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Proof must be submitted with application.

Required Text: Brady Essentials of Emergency Care Refresher for EMT-B 3rd Edition.

## Fire Officer Programs

### Building Construction: Combustible

This National Fire Academy course provides an introduction to basic construction principles and to the specific characteristics of combustible construction as it pertains to the fire service. The primary emphasis of this course is to improve the firefighter's ability to ensure personal safety by recognizing common causes and indicators of failure or other hazards related to building construction. An understanding of the course material, will improve operational effectiveness, as the firefighter will be able to better predict the overall reaction of a building to fire conditions. Participants will receive a Connecticut Fire Academy and National Fire Academy certificate of attendance

### Building Construction: Non-Combustible

This National Fire Academy course provides an introduction to the special characteristics of non-combustible and fire-resistive construction as they pertain to the fire service. The primary emphasis of the course is to improve the firefighter's ability to ensure firefighter safety by recognizing common causes and indicators of failure and other hazards related to building construction or contents. An understanding of the course material will improve operational effectiveness, as the firefighter will be able to better predict the overall reaction of a building to fire conditions. Participants will receive a Connecticut Fire Academy and National Fire Academy certificate of attendance.

### Fire Officer I



Fire Officer I is a comprehensive course designed to strengthen the new or aspiring fire officer's supervisory and leadership skills. Emergency and routine duties of the company officer will be discussed. Oriented to the level of Lieutenant, topics covered in this course include: human resource management, community and government relations, public education, safety, inspection and investigation and emergency service delivery. Students will spend limited time in a fire command simulator during the emergency service delivery section of the course.

Training Prerequisite: Certified Fire Service Instructor I.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: Fire Officer, Principles and Practices 2nd Edition.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

### Fire Officer II



This course is designed for those fire officers or aspiring officers that need the skills to supervise multiple companies. Generally, this level involves the management of company supervisors involved in the operational aspects of a fire station. Oriented to the level of Captain, topics covered in this course include: group behavior, employee evaluation, communication skills, report preparation, pre-fire and operational planning, inspections, command of hazardous materials incidents, safety and emergency services delivery. Students will spend limited time in a fire command simulator during the

emergency service delivery section of this course.

Training Prerequisites: Fire Officer I.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: Fire Officer, Principles and Practices 2nd Edition.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer I and Certified Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

### Fire Officer III



Organizational Administration is a non-traditional course offered to individuals currently holding or approaching the rank of shift commander or chief officer. It is designed to enhance the skills of the chief officer by providing a group of peers with a progressive learning environment. This semi-independent study course includes a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussion sessions and development of individual written projects. Oriented to the level of Shift Commander, topics covered in the discussions and projects will include human resource management, community relations, administration, inspection and investigation, emergency services delivery and safety. In order to project a professional image in the classroom students should wear appropriate attire or their department daily uniform.

Training Prerequisites: Applicants must either be currently certified to the level of Certified Fire Officer II and Fire Service Instructor II (Proof must be submitted with initial application) or have served as a chief officer for at least three (3) years.

Applicant Selection Procedure: This program is open to all current shift commanders and chief officers, holding Fire Officer II and Fire Service Instructor II certification. Applicants not currently holding a training or chief officer title may be admitted to the program if they are currently a Captain and provide a letter from their chief stating that they are either currently functioning at the level of Shift Commander or are expected to assume that role within the next three (3) years.

The process of applying for this program requires the following:

- 1) Completion of the standard Connecticut Fire Academy course application paperwork.
- 2) Completion of a supplemental application and submitting a resume.

Upon completion of these items, the Connecticut Fire Academy Program Manager for the Fire Officer Programs and at least one Fire Officer III instructor will review the applications and select up to fifteen individuals to participate in the program.

A supplemental application and resume will be required from each officer applying to the Fire Officer III program. The supplemental application and resume submitted will be used to make a final determination as to whether or not they will be admitted to the class.

Applicant Selection Procedure:

While every attempt will be made to select a cross-section of participants, priority will be given in the following order:

1) Applicants currently serving in the capacity of Training Officer, Shift Commander or Battalion Chief.

2) Applicants currently holding the rank of Captain.

Required Text: The reference books used for this course will be the current edition of the IFSTA Chief Officer.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer II and Certified Fire Service Instructor II. Proof must be submitted with initial application. Certification will be achieved through a combination of project process assessments, oral and written examinations.

Certification testing time: requires additional time for the oral examination panel.

## Fire Officer IV

This semi-independent study course consists of a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussion sessions and the development of individual projects. Areas covered in the discussions and projects will focus heavily on human resource management, administration, multi-agency emergency services delivery and safety. Oriented to the level of Assistant Chief, deputy Chief or Chief, topics covered in this course include: grievance administration, training and educational goal setting and planning, employee assistance programs, incentive programs, community event planning, long-range planning, and civil disturbance and disaster planning. In order to project a professional image in the classroom, students should wear appropriate attire or their department daily uniform.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer III or have served as an Assistant Chief, deputy Chief or Chief for at least three (3) years.

Applicant Selection Procedure: This program is open to all current shift commanders and chief officers, holding Fire Officer III certification.

The process of applying for this program requires the following:

1) Completion of the standard Connecticut Fire Academy course application paperwork.

2) Completion of a separate information statement/supplementary application.

Upon completion of these items, the Connecticut Fire Academy Program Manager for the Fire Officer Programs and at least one Fire Officer IV instructor will review the applications and select up to fifteen individuals to participate in the program. Applicants not currently holding the rank of Training Officer, Assistant Chief, Deputy Chief or Chief will be required to provide a letter from their chief stating that they are either functioning at the level of Assistant Chief or Deputy Chief level or are expected to be promoted to either of those ranks within the next three (3) years.

While every attempt will be made to select a cross-section of participants, priority will be given in the following order:

1) Applicants currently serving in the capacity of Assistant Chief, Deputy Chief or Chief.

2) Applicants currently serving in the capacity of Shift Commander, Training Officer or Battalion Chief.

Required Text: The reference books used for this course will be the current edition IFSTA Chief Officer and Fire Department Strategic Planning by Mark Wallace, Published by Pennwell Fire Engineering.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer III; proof must be submitted with the application. Certification will be achieved through a combination of project process assessments, oral and written examinations. Certification testing time: requires additional date for the oral examination panel.

## Fire Service Instructor I - Instructional Methodology

This course is designed to meet the first level of instructor as identified in the NFPA 1041 standard. Topics covered during the course include: adult learning and communication, understanding performance objectives, evaluation, and methods of instruction. Students will present from a prepared lesson plan. Study and support materials are online. Access to a computer with internet access is mandatory. Homework assignments and formative assessments will be completed and submitted online.

Successful completion of this course will prepare the student to take the Fire Service Instructor I Practical Skills and Written Certification Examinations.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter II. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett Fire Service Instructor: Principles and Practice, 1st Edition

Certification testing time: require an additional date for certification written exam.

## Fire Service Instructor II/III Curriculum Development and Instructional Leadership

This course is designed to meet the second and third levels of instructor as identified in the NFPA 1041 standard. Topics covered include: management of instructional resources, development of instructional materials, conducting classes and supervising instructors, administration, records, policy, personnel, analysis, evaluation, program and curriculum development.

Candidates will present from student developed lesson plan. This is a blended learning course. Instructional Leadership requirements will be completed online. Access to a computer with internet access is mandatory. Study and support materials are online.

Successful completion of this course will prepare the student to take the Fire Service Instructor II Practical Skills and Written Certification Examinations and the FSI-III Written Certification Exam.

Class Hours: FSI-II 48 hours. Candidates will have 90 days to complete FSI-III requirements.

Maximum class size: 16

Training Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I and Station Evaluator.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett Fire Service Instructor: Principles and Practice, 1st Edition

For FSI-III: Certified Fire Service Instructor II. Candidates will submit application for the exam after successfully passing the FSI-II exam and successful completion of FSI-III course requirements

## Health and Safety Officer

This National Fire Academy course examines the Health and Safety Officer's role with the identification, evaluation and implementation of policies and procedures that affect the health and safety aspects for emergency responders.

Through the use of case studies, small group workshops and instructor facilitation of safety concepts, participants will gain a thorough understanding of risk management; wellness issues; incident safety functions; regulatory requirements and their impact on increasing the survivability of fire department personnel. This course is designed for individuals who have department level health and safety responsibilities. Attendees should have a working knowledge of ICS, applicable NFPA and OSHA requirements, and responsibility for setting policy for their department on such issues.

Training Prerequisites: None

Required text: IFSTA Fire Department Safety Officer, 1st Edition, NFPA Standard 1500; National Fire Academy Student Manuals; Incident Safety Officer; Health and Safety Officer; OSHA 3130, 1993 (revised).

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer I, or have been a Fire Officer with a department on or before July 1, 1986. Student must be a documented Health and Safety Officer for their department. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 16

Course Fee: \$150.00

## Incident Safety Officer: Fire Suppression

The goal of this course is to provide students with the knowledge and skills needed to perform the duties of the Incident Safety Officer (ISO) during incident operations and training evolutions.

This course is designed for fire and emergency medical services (EMS) responders who may be designated by the Incident Commander (IC) as an ISO while working within an Incident Command System (ICS). These assignments may occur during firefighting, EMS, special operations type incidents, and training evolutions.

This course is an incident-specific, scenario-oriented course designed to teach students what an ISO needs to know at an incident. The course uses instructor-led discussion, multimedia activities, and small group discussions to convey instructional points.

Training Prerequisites: None

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer I, or have been a Fire Officer with a department on or before July 1, 1986. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 16                      Course Fee: \$150.00

## Public Information Officer

This course is designed to instruct participants in the basic methods for establishing and maintaining a positive relationship with the news media. Fire department activities—including public fire education programs, man-made and natural disasters, and emergencies, make developing policies and training for dealing with the news media essential. Discussion topics will cover: public disclosure laws; media relations; and news releases. Participants will learn the basics of preparing news releases, setting up press conferences, and the responsibilities of the Public Information Officer (PIO) at the scene of an emergency.

Students will participate in a mock briefing with reporters from various media sources.

Training Prerequisites: None

Required Text: IFSTA Public Information Officer CD Rom 1st Edition

Class Hours: 16                      FM Credit: 8

## Station Evaluator Training

This half-day program is designed to establish a standard testing environment for students taking certification skill evaluations. Participants will learn the criteria for being professional and effective station evaluators. Participants will also practice completing skill sheets after viewing videotaped performances.

Any instructor wishing to become a station evaluator at any state certification exam site must complete this course.

Prerequisites: Participants must be state certified as a Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with application.

## Strategy and Tactics I: Fundamentals

This two day course introduces the officer candidate to the philosophy and tools required for leadership decision making during emergencies. Subjects covered will be a review of the National Incident Management System (NIMS), Incident Priorities and Decision making, the basics of fire behavior and building construction, "size-up", evaluation and assessment as well as the difference between "strategy and tactics" using such tools as Layman's Tactical Model and RECEO VS, Terpak's COAL TWAS WEALTHS or Norman's version COAL WAS WEALTH and offensive versus defensive operations.

## Strategy and Tactics II: Common Everyday Emergencies and Service Calls

This three-day course takes the firefighter and company officer through the everyday calls that take up the majority of fire service responses. These are the most common calls where the responder deals with the citizens and public the most. These calls are often referred to a "nuisance" calls by first responders but to the occupant or those effected by it, the incident could be a crisis. Common calls involve; utility issues: gas, electric, water; carbon monoxide detector activations; oil burners and heating units; auto accidents and fires; elevator emergencies; dumpster fires; auto fires; automatic alarm activations.

Class Hours: 24                      Course Fee: \$90.00

## Strategy and Tactics III: Bread and Butter Calls

This two-day course takes the experienced fire fighter through the basics of fire ground decision-making. These are the "room and content", everyday calls that any fire department should be able to control with even limited resources. It teaches the student to formulate an overall strategy, and to then employ the appropriate tactics to support that strategy using time-tested models. In-class scenarios are shown on the screen for the student to apply the lessons.

## Strategy and Tactics IV: Multi-Company Alarm

This two-day course enhances the students' previous introduction to Strategy and Tactics to a larger scale of incident demand and resources required. It starts with a classroom session that includes a quick overview of basic strategy and tactics and the incident command system. It then teaches the fire officer to address issues common to major incidents, such as logistics, safety, planning, communications, community coverage, and dealing with the press.

## Strategy and Tactics V: Peterborough – Case Studies

This two-day class teaches the experienced fire officer to handle major incidents within a community. The course is designed to "put it all together" based on actual case studies.

It then teaches the fire officer to address issues common to major incidents, such as logistics, safety, planning, communications, community coverage, and dealing with the press. The student applies these lessons using scenarios played out in the community of Peterborough, a large tabletop community set up in the classroom. The students have the opportunity to serve in different capacities within a command system developed by the class to deal with the scenarios presented.

From small rural communities to large metropolitan environments, we can all be affected by Hurricanes, Blizzards, Wind Storms, Floods, Hazardous Materials Incidents and even Riots that require coordination, change in tactics and reduction in resources.

## Firefighting Program

### Firefighter Safety and Survival

This course is currently under revision to comply with NFPA 1407 Training Fire Service Rapid Intervention Crews, 2010. When the calendar was published, no delivery dates were scheduled. ## Flashover Survival

Flashover Survival begins with a classroom presentation followed by a simulation of a pending flashover in the Connecticut Fire Academy flashover simulator. The flashover simulator offers firefighters the opportunity to observe fire behavior and the signs of an impending flashover in a controlled setting. This training is an experience of a lifetime that could save your life. Students should bring a bottle of water or sport drink to re-hydrate throughout the training.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder. Long pants are required to participate in the flashover live burns. Shorts alone are not acceptable.

The Connecticut Fire Academy will not be responsible for damages to PPE. Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

A separate flashover permission slip is required at the time of registration.

## Recruit Firefighter

This 14-week resident course focuses on developing the knowledge, skills and abilities needed for a new firefighter to perform entry-level tasks under direct supervision. One of the first components of the course is to establish in the recruit a strong desire and will for self-discipline, teamwork, company morale, orderliness and precision. The fire department organizational structure will be defined showing the role and responsibility of the firefighter and the officer in the organization. The training for a recruit firefighter will consist of theory, backed with appropriate skill development. The theory and practical skills development combination will be delivered on an incremental basis for maximum retention and skill development. This approach will develop competency in the recruit and reduce the risk of injury. Recruits will reside at the Connecticut Fire Academy weekdays throughout the course. At the conclusion of this course, the recruit firefighter will be tested to the Firefighter I and Firefighter II and Hazardous Materials – First Responder Awareness and Operational. After local orientation, the firefighter will be able to be assigned to a firefighting company.

The course covers a broad range of topics that today's firefighter faces on a daily basis and includes: Daily Physical Fitness, Cultural Diversity, Employee Assistance Program, NIMS-700, Flashover, NIMS for the Fire Service, Calling the MayDay, So You're in the Front Seat Toady, Reading Smoke at Building Fires, Ground Fires, Thermal Imaging for the Fire Service, Basic Pump Operations, Basic Aerial Operations, Introduction to Fire Investigation, Elevator Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, MASS Decon Trailer Operations, Handling Utility Emergencies, Courage to be Safe, Firefighter Safety and Survival, Rapid Intervention Teams and Rescue Core.

The Recruit Firefighter training program at the Connecticut Fire Academy has been approved for veteran education benefits.

Course fee includes tuition, student manuals, lodging, breakfast and lunch. PPE Requirement: Full Personal Protective Equipment with SCBA and 2 spare bottles.

## Traffic Incident Management

Course is designed to aid departments that are involved with managing traffic at emergency scenes. The program covers the roles of the emergency responder in traffic control, state statutes, required training, communication guidelines, personal protective clothing and traffic control equipment, determining traffic control zones and practical exercises. Meets or exceeds Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Chapter 6.

Maximum class size: 20.

Training Prerequisite: ICS 100, 200, 700. Must be an active member of a fire department, CERT team, or emergency medical service. Proof must be submitted with application.

## Fire Prevention Programs

### Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I

The goal of the course is to provide the skills and tools necessary to become a Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I. The class will address the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I including: Introduction; Primary Prevention; Identification and Intake; Who Sets Fires and Why, and Interviewing and Intervention Strategies. Students will be introduced to NPFA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I Professional Standard. The individual will learn to conduct an interview with a firesetter and their family using prepared forms and guidelines and who based on recommended practice may determine the need for referral for counseling and/or implement educational intervention strategies to mitigate effects of firesetting behavior.

Course is designed for individuals that have responsibilities related to Juvenile Firesetting Intervention, interviewing, and prevention. The target audience includes practitioners who interact with children who are involved in firesetting and/or arson behavior and their families. In addition to the fire service, professionals from a myriad of fields including Mental Health, Law Enforcement, Education, Counseling Services, and Social Services can benefit from the training.

### Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II

The goal of the course is to provide the skills and tools necessary to become a Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II. The class will address the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II including: Identification and Intake; Coalition Building Support and Management; Budget and Funding; Development of a Juvenile Handbook, Resource Directory, Data Base, and Program Evaluation. Students will be introduced

to the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II Professional Standard. The individual will learn to develop and coordinate a child firesetting intervention program and the activities of Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist. The course develops skills including interviewing and assessment, program development, implementation, and evaluation.

Course is designed for individuals that have or will have responsibilities related to the management and/or coordination of a Juvenile Firesetting Intervention program.

## Kid's Fire Safety House

The Kid's Fire Safety House is a mobile educational trailer used by community educators to teach preschool to high school aged children home safety. This educational tool allows children to practice escaping from a simulated house fire. The trailer uses electronically operated smoke detectors and a non-toxic smoke in a simulated bedroom to create a realistic environment where children can practice escaping from a house in the event of a fire. Additional features of the trailer enable the educator to teach kitchen safety, home heating safety and reporting an emergency.

Who Can Reserve the Kid's Fire Safety House?

Community educators, including Fire & Life Safety Educators and others engaged in teaching fire or other life-safety skills to the public. This includes fire and emergency medical service organizations and schools.

## Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I

This is an entry-level course that will prepare anyone who performs public education duties to present existing programs to all audiences. The course addresses fire prevention activities, the major causes of unintentional injury, characteristics of learning, evaluation of lesson plans, presentation methods, effective usage of audiovisual aids, successfully dealing with the media and recordkeeping. This course meets the requirements of NFPA 1035, "Professional Qualifications for Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I". Reference material is required for the class.

The Connecticut Fire Academy is offering the fourth year of educational workshops for hazardous materials, to enhance the first responder's skills, knowledge and ability to safely plan for, respond, and mitigate incidents involving dangerous substances. The instructor's will be subject matter experts.

## Rescue Programs

*NOTE: The programs listed in the calendar as Rescue Technician are currently being up-dated to the latest NFPA 1006 standard. Therefore the class description, contact hours, and course fee are subject to change. When available, updates will be posted on the DESPP/CFPC website.*

### Cold Water Rescue

This course is designed for first responders operating at the scene of a cold water or ice rescue. Topics covered include: pre-planning, risk assessment, ice types and how they form, hypothermia, cold water drowning, incident size-up, water rescue equipment, and rescue operations. Participants will

perform simulated water and ice (if available) rescues using cold water entry suits and associated equipment.

Training Prerequisites: None

Class Hours: 16

Course Fee: \$65.00

### Rescue Technician – Confined Space

This course will train students to perform technician level confined space rescue operations. The training objectives meet NFPA 1006 and OSHA 1910.146. Students will learn to preplan, evaluate atmospheres and use protective equipment related to confined spaces, implement and terminate an incident management system for confined space. Students will exercise their previous knowledge for victim management and rope rescue techniques to remove a victim from a confined space. The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisites: Rescue Technician Core and Hazardous Materials Operational; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and EMR certification

For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the certification written and practical exams.

Class Hours: 48

Course Fee: \$400.00

### Rescue Technician – Core

This course is designed to meet the job performance requirements in chapter 5 of NFPA 1006 Rescue Technician. Students will learn the basics of site operations, size-up, resource management, hazard/risk assessment, ground support for helicopter operations and incident management as it relates to the rescue environment. Students will learn skills to use rope-rescue equipment to manage victims, anchor-rope systems, build and operate lowering and hauling systems in a low angle environment. Students will also be able to inspect and maintain related rescue equipment.

This program is a prerequisite for all technical rescue certification courses.

The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisite: Firefighter I and Haz Mat Operational

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Minimum EMR; proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 48

Course Fee: \$350.00

### Rescue Technician – Rope

This program will train the students to perform technician level rope rescue to the NFPA 1006 Rescue Technician standard. The training will focus on rescue situations in the high-angle environment. The students will identify and construct anchoring systems, rappel and belay lines, lowering and hauling mechanical advantage systems.

The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core; proof must be submitted with the application. For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Class Hours: 48

Course Fee: \$400.00

### Rescue Technician – Trench

This program will train the students to perform technician level trench rescue. The training objectives meet NFPA 1006 and OSHA 1926. Students will evaluate trenches and soil conditions; will learn to shore unprotected straight and intersecting trenches with both community and pneumatic shoring. They will also use supplemental shoring when needed. Students develop an action plan to manage and remove a victim from a trench accident.

The PPE requirements are a protective helmet, footwear, gloves, eye protection, and work clothes.

Training prerequisites: Rescue Technician Core and Hazardous Materials Operational; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core; proof must be submitted with the application.

For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for certification written and practical exam.

Class Hours: 48

Course Fee: \$400.00

### Rescue Technician – Vehicle and Machinery

This program meets the requirements of Chapter 8 of the Rescue Technician Professional Qualifications standard. Through classroom sessions and hands-on application you will plan for vehicle/machinery incidents, establish scene safety zones, establish fire protection, perform required stabilization, isolate potentially harmful energy sources, determine and create access and egress points, disentangle victims, remove a packaged victim and terminate the incident. Completion of this program and the Rescue Technical CORE program that covers Chapter 5 of the 1006 standard will allow you to take the certification examination for Vehicle and Machinery Rescue Technician. Full protective Clothing (no SCBA) required.

Training Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core; proof must be submitted with the application. For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for certification written and practical exam.

## Special Programs

### Advanced Introduction to the Fire Service

This program is designed to enhance skills learned during Introduction to the Fire Service and is limited to youth ages 16-17. Topics include On-scene communications (Portable Radio work), EMS/On-scene rehabilitation, Leadership, Basic Instructional Methodology, Introduction to Rope Rescue, Extrication (Stabilization and tool use), Standpipe Operations, Fire Department Organization and Structure, Hose and Ladders. This program will be held in a camp-type "atmosphere" simulating a firehouse environment. Each student will reside at the Connecticut Fire Academy for the duration of the course. All meals and lodging are included in the tuition.

Full protective clothing including helmet, bunker coat, gloves, boots, bunker pants, and eye protection is required for this program.

A special application is required to register for this class, which will be available in

May of 2012.

Prerequisite: Graduate of Introduction to the Fire Service.

Class Hours: 6 days. Max class size 20 students.

### Peer Fitness Trainer Workshop

#### International Association of Fire Fighters, International Association of Fire Chief's, American Council on Exercise

The purpose of the IAFF-IAFC-ACE PFT certification program is to provide a fitness trainer standard consistent with the health and fitness needs of the Fire Service throughout the United States and Canada. The Peer Fitness Trainer (PFT) program was created so interested fire department personnel could obtain certification in fitness-program design and implementation in order to help their peers with their fitness programs on a one-on-one basis and to help with the physical training of recruits.

The PFT program is coordinated by the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control and held at the Connecticut Fire Academy. This workshop draws students from around the country and will fill up very quickly. At this time no delivery dates have been scheduled, watch for delivery dates and locations for this class at the Connecticut Fire Academy website [www.ct.gov/cfpc](http://www.ct.gov/cfpc)

Class Hours: 40

Course Fee: \$700.00

### Introduction to the Fire Service

This program will focus on introducing youth ages 14-17 to the fire service. Topics include: Fire Department Organization and Structure, Fire Science, Ropes and Knots, Ladders, Fire Streams, Search and Rescue, and Wildland Firefighting. This program will be held in a camp-type "atmosphere" simulating a firehouse environment. Each student will reside at the Connecticut Fire Academy for the duration of the course. All meals and lodging are included in the tuition.

Full protective clothing including helmet, bunker coat, gloves, boots, bunker pants, and eye protection is required for this program.

A special application is required to register for this class which will be available in the early spring of 2012.

Class Hours: 6 days

Course Fee: TBA

### National Fire Academy Direct Delivery Fire Prevention for First Responders and Small Departments

This two day inspirational course stresses the awareness, advocacy, and motivational content needed by those who traditionally have been focused on operations (suppression, EMS, etc.) and who seek to learn new, successful approaches appropriate for communities of all sizes, but most especially for America's smaller communities. The course focuses on identifying exciting and highly successful tools and approaches for addressing the total fire protection challenge via lessons learned in other communities, resources available, and the means and value of building partnerships and coalitions. Students will come away empowered to make change and thus build departments more effective at serving both customers and members, by learning how to manage the fire prevention function better.

This course is appropriate for leaders, both today's and tomorrow's, in the Nation's smaller departments (typically those of less than 25,000 in population). This course is open to all interested emergency services a personnel including volunteer, and career. The class is intended primarily for those who have served in operations and who seek to learn more effective ways of combating the fire problem.

Class Hours: 16

FM Credit: 8

Course Fee: \$60.00

### National Fire Academy Direct Delivery Marketing Fire Prevention in Your Community

In this two day course students begin developing a marketing plan for fire prevention using resources already in place in their communities. Upon completion of this course, students will be able to continue developing, refining, and applying a marketing plan that will outline target hazard risk, identify significant opponents, and present allies who may be available within their community.

This course is appropriate for those who seek to learn new approaches to deal more easily with their community's fire and injury challenges, including departmental "leaders," both today's and tomorrow's, operational and administrative, in the Nation's smaller departments. Open to all interested emergency services personnel, including volunteer, career, and allied professions, the class is intended primarily for those who are serving or who have served previously in operations (suppression, EMS, etc.), and who seek to learn about more effective ways of combating the fire problem. Personnel with little or no prevention orientation will benefit significantly.

Class Hours: 16

FM Credit: 8

Course Fee: \$60.00

### National Fire Academy Direct Delivery Training Operations in Small Departments

This two day course is designed to provide students with some basic tools and skills to coordinate training in a small fire/EMS organization. A training function in a smaller department typically may include conducting training drills and coordinating training with a nearby larger city or State training agency. Course content includes; leadership issues in fire service training, such as why and how the local training officer must be a catalyst for change, and personal motivators within the department. This course will identify the legal issues affecting the training function, including an understanding of a standard of care, and the impact of OSHA and NFPA standards. Course content covers; safety considerations in training, marketing training internally, identifying ways to justify training needs and resolving training conflicts using appropriate conflict resolution techniques. Students will learn how to select and evaluate training curriculum and materials from outside sources and effective delivery and evaluation of training.

This course is appropriate for fire and rescue personnel who coordinate training in small departments, volunteer firefighters and officers who instruct in small fire and rescue departments, fire personnel serving on training committees and training officers in volunteer fire departments.

## CPAT Orientation & Physical Conditioning

The Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT) consists of eight separate events. CPAT is a sequence of events requiring you to progress along a predetermined path from event to event in a continuous manner. The events include: Stair Climb, Hose Drag, Equipment Carry, Ladder Raise and Extension, Forcible Entry, Maze Search, Victim Drag and Ceiling Breach and Pull. This test was developed to allow fire departments to obtain pools of trainable candidates who are physically able to perform essential job tasks on the fire scene. This is a pass/fail test based on a validated maximum total time of 10 minutes and 20 seconds.

During the events, you wear a 50-pound vest to simulate the weight of a self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and firefighter protective clothing, a helmet and gloves. An additional 25 pounds, using two 12.5-pound weights which simulate a high-rise pack (hose bundle), is added to your shoulders for the stair climb event only. Throughout all events, you must wear long pants, footwear with no open heel or toe, a provided hard hat with chinstrap, and provided work gloves. Watches and loose or restrictive jewelry are not permitted.

All props are designed to obtain the necessary information regarding your physical ability. The tools and equipment were chosen to provide the highest level of consistency, safety and validity in measuring your physical abilities. The events and distances between events are always the same.

The events are placed in a sequence that best simulates fire scene events while allowing an 85-foot walk between events. To ensure the highest level of safety and to prevent exhaustion, no running is allowed between events. This walk intentionally allows you approximately 20 seconds to recover and regroup before each event.

The history of Candidate Physical Ability Testing in Connecticut has shown beyond a doubt that preparation is the key to success. CPAT is extremely demanding. CPAT tests your strength, agility, balance and ability to follow directions while under physical and emotional stress. Many have made the error in believing they can pass without proper preparation. The Connecticut Fire Academy is required to offer detailed Orientations and two Practice Tests prior to the administration of CPAT. The orientations include a review of all materials within the Candidate Guide booklet. More importantly, the orientations give the candidate the opportunity to perform a self-evaluation by physically reviewing and using the same equipment used in the testing process. The Practice Tests allow candidates to run the test course under timed conditions. If the Practice Test is conducted under "CPAT Conditions" and the candidate passes, it will be counted as passing CPAT. Attending the orientations and practice tests is highly recommended.

To allow for the required eight week CPAT preparatory period as well as the time to process the CPAT applications, a deadline has been established for registering for both the spring and fall testing cycles. Applications received after the published deadline will not be accepted and you will not be able to test during that CPAT testing cycle. Those who have been accepted into the CPAT testing process will receive a packet with information on the testing process and the CPAT Waiver Form that lists the dates and times for their orientations, practice tests and the CPAT test. If you do not receive a CPAT packet during the two weeks following the application deadline, it is your responsibility to contact the Connecticut Fire Academy

within thirty days of the application deadline to verify you are registered and that we have your proper mailing address. Inquiries made after the thirty day time period will not be acted on and you will not be allowed to participate in that CPAT testing cycle.

Please refer to our website at [www.ct.gov/cfpc](http://www.ct.gov/cfpc) for a listing of the CPAT application deadlines and to download the current CPAT Application form. It is also highly recommended that you download and review the Candidate Preparation Guide and the Candidate Orientation Guide.

**The CPAT testing fee is \$150.00 of which \$50 is a non-refundable processing fee. Registered candidates who wish to withdraw from the CPAT testing process must do so in writing to the CPAT Program Manager. The written request for a refund of the CPAT testing fee (minus the \$50 processing fee) must be received at the Connecticut Fire Academy at least one day prior to the candidate's first scheduled orientation. Requests for refunds received on or after the candidate's first orientation date will not be considered.**

### 2012 CPAT Schedule

The Connecticut Fire Academy offers a spring and fall testing cycle. It is important to understand that all orientations, practice tests, and CPAT tests are based on two application deadlines. Applications must be received by the application deadline to be registered for that testing cycle. The 2012 application deadlines are **February 10, 2012** for the spring testing cycle and **July 27, 2012** for the fall testing cycle.

Candidates will be sent a packet containing a participant manual and their assigned orientations, practice tests, and CPAT test dates and times approximately two weeks after the application deadline.

### CPAT Cancellations by the Connecticut Fire Academy

CPAT may be cancelled due to a number of conditions affecting testing. The main reason for cancellation is adverse weather. The weather can be very unpredictable, do not rely on your local weather reports, as the conditions may be different at the test site. It is highly recommended that you call 877-528-3473 (in state), (860) 627-6363 (out of state) extension 415 Prior to traveling to the testing site. There will be a prerecorded message stating that the test is either running or has been cancelled. Unfortunately, the test can be cancelled at the last minute. If you are traveling a long distance we encourage you to call extension 415 several times during your travel.

If the CPAT test is cancelled the message on extension 415 will state how and or when you will be notified of the rescheduled CPAT test date.



# CERTIFICATION

## National Professional Qualifications Standards

The State of Connecticut Commission on Fire Prevention and Control is pleased to offer Fire Service Certification to the members of Connecticut's fire service. Certification is an excellent means by which an individual may measure his/her knowledge, skills, and abilities against a national standard and that of their peers.

As indicated below, the Commission currently offers 40 levels of certification. The National Fire Protection Association Professional Qualifications Standard against which the examination is based is noted below. The Commission has adopted the most current edition of the noted Standards as the Standards for Certification.

The certification examination process for each level consists of a written or oral examination and a practical skills examination. The levels of Firefighter I and Firefighter II also require verification of live fire suppression activities.

All of the Commission's Certification levels have been accredited by the National Board on Fire Service Professional Qualifications and the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress.

This summary is designed to provide an overview of the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control's Certification Process. For more detailed information, including the specific examination requirements for each level, please contact the Certification Division at 860-627-6363.

## Indemnification of Instructors

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Section 7-323q of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (Effective October 1, 2010):

The state shall save harmless and indemnify any person certified as a fire service instructor by the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control under section 7-323l from financial loss and expense, including legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of alleged negligence or other act resulting in personal injury or property damage, which acts are not wanton, reckless or malicious, provided such person, at the time of the acts resulting in such injury or damage, was acting in the discharge of such person's duties (1) as an employee or member of a municipal, state or tribal nation fire department to provide fire service training and instruction for the other members or employees of such municipal, state or tribal nation fire department, (2) as a fire service instructor employed by said commission to provide fire service training and instruction on behalf of said commission, or (3) as a fire service instructor employed by a regional fire school to provide fire service training and instruction on behalf of such school.

The Training Division of the State of Connecticut Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection/Commission on Fire Prevention and Control has streamlined the process by which individuals may participate in certain training programs by eliminating as training prerequisites certification examination requirements. The responsibility for ensuring that individuals are qualified to participate in a certification examination now shifts from the Training Registrar to the individual certification candidate. Candidates for Certification are now personally required to ensure that they have met all prerequisites prior to submitting an examination application and are required to submit any required documentation prior to the examination. Failure to do so will result in rejection of the examination application.

Additionally, State of Connecticut Regulations require that all candidates for certification be 18 years of age at the time of the examination and that candidates for certification be a member of a fire department with the exception of Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I and II which allow direct entry into those levels.

## **CERTIFICATION DIVISION**

### **ACCOMMODATIONS FOR CANDIDATES WITH LEARNING/READING DISABILITIES PARTICIPATING IN WRITTEN CERTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS FOR FIREFIGHTER - I ONLY**

#### **I. General Policy**

A. In accordance with Section 7-323I-95 (d) of the Regulation of the State of Connecticut, all examinations and/or components of examinations shall be structured and administered in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The Certification Division will make reasonable accommodations to the known learning/reading disabilities of candidates to the extent feasible. Accommodating the individual handicapped candidate's needs while maintaining the integrity of the certification testing process will be of primary consideration.

#### **II. Reasonable Accommodations**

Reasonable accommodations to be made in test administration are specified below in Section V. One or a combination of accommodations may be necessary for individual candidates according to their needs and the requirements of the test material to be presented to them. The Director of Certification may allow other accommodations on a case-by-case basis.

#### **III. Documentation of Handicapping Condition**

Each candidate requesting accommodations that effect actual test conditions will be required to furnish documentation of the handicapping condition and the accommodation(s) needed. Documentation must be sent to the Director of Certification. The proper individual examination application form and testing fees must accompany the above documentation. All documentation submitted shall remain confidential.

#### **IV. Testing Location**

Administration of examinations for individuals with learning/reading disabilities will be at the offices of the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control in Windsor Locks. At the direction of the Director of Certification, an examination proctor may administer examinations in the field under very strict guidelines.

#### **V. Accommodation Options**

The following are the accommodation options which may be afforded to the candidate. Other accommodations may be made available to the candidate based upon the individual needs. The Commission may or may not be fiscally responsible for accommodations made.

- A. Additional time
- B. Individual monitor or special attention to assure the candidate has understood instructions
- C. Oral examination

#### **IV. Exception**

The expectation for a first responder will be to read and write in American English at Hazardous Materials incidents. Therefore, no accommodations can be made during any hazardous materials Awareness, Operational or Technician Level cognitive or psychomotor Certification examination.

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
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## DIRECTIONS TO CONNECTICUT FIRE ACADEMY

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I-91 North or South to exit 40 (Route 20, Bradley Connector). Follow Route 20 West 1.7 miles to the exit for Route 75. Take a right off the exit onto Route 75 North and follow 2.5 miles. Take a left onto Perimeter Road (see sign for the CT Fire Academy and the New England Air Museum). Continue 1.4 miles to the Academy, which will be on your right. Parking is available at the rear of the building.



## Lodging at the Connecticut Fire Academy

Students requiring lodging for a confirmed training program or event at the Connecticut Fire Academy may reserve a room by calling (860) 627-6363 Ext. 421 during normal business hours (8:30 am – 4:30 pm) Monday through Friday. Lodging availability is at the discretion of the agency based upon evening staffing resources. Reservations are generally available on a first-come, first-served basis with a minimum 72 hour advanced reservation. Each Dormitory room is equipped with a private bath; bed linens and towels are provided however guests are welcome to bring their own pillow and linens/sleeping bag to make their stay more comfortable. Free wireless internet is provided throughout the facility and a student lounge with television, commercial refrigerator and microwave is available to all guests. Shared commercial laundry equipment is available for resident use as well. In addition, there is a fully equipped work-out facility open 24-hours.
