CONNECTICUT FALLEN FIREFIGHTERS MEMORIAL

Located on the grounds of the Connecticut Fire Academy in Windsor Locks, stands the Connecticut Firefighters Memorial dedicated to Connecticut Firefighters who have lost their lives in the line of duty.

The Memorial was first envisioned in 1992 with the establishment of a Memorial Committee by the Connecticut State Firefighters Association. A ground breaking was held

on June 12, 2001. The Memorial is the first of its kind in the state honoring Connecticut Firefighters who gave the ultimate sacrifice with more than 300 names engraved in the granite panels that surround the Memorial.

The design of the Memorial was conceived by the Connecticut Firefighters Memorial Committee incorporating a plaza-like setting, featuring a brick patio in the form of the Maltese Cross,

the universal symbol of the fire service. The centerpiece of the Memorial is a six foot by twelve foot polished impala black granite stone bearing the likeness of four firefighters fighting a blaze; Lieutenant Paul Walsh of the New Britain Fire Department designed the artist's rendition of the firefighters. The centerpiece rests upon a base of concrete and gray granite to which are affixed plaques with the engraved names of those who have lost their lives. The plaques are numbered with roman numerals to ease the task of locating names. Atop the base, in front of the centerpiece is an eternal flame to acknowledge and honor this group of brave and noble firefighters. Surrounding the centerpiece are eight granite sitting benches representing the eight counties in Connecticut.

On September 25, 2011, the Memorial site saw the addition of a steel artifact from the World Trade Center. The nearly twelve foot tall beam weighing 1200 pounds is a lasting memorial to the 343 FDNY firefighters, other first responders and civilians who perished as a result of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001.

The 2014 CSFA Fallen Firefighters Memorial Ceremony is scheduled for Sunday, September 28, 2014. Please attend and honor Connecticut's Bravest!

The Memorial Site is accessible 24 hours a day for the public to pay tribute to Connecticut's Bravest.

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

Certification examination reference materials may be found at www.ct.gov/cfpc in the "Testing and Certification" section. Only those meeting certification prerequisites will be allowed to test.

APPARATUS PROGRAMS

Aerial Operator

This six-day course meets NFPA Standard 1002 for the driver/operator section, which addresses aerial devices.

Instruction will be given on: aerial, tower ladders and articulating booms. Course content will prepare the student for the practical and written examinations for Aerial Operator certification. This course is designed for the driver/operator of aerial equipment. The course begins with road handling and moves on to apparatus placement, mobilization and stabilization, elevation, various aerial operations and apparatus readiness. It is required that each student has access to the manufacturer's reference manual for their department aerial device. This course alone is not designed to produce expert aerial operators. Students must apply the basics learned from this course with continued hands-on practical applications with apparatus in their department to build and maintain proficiency in aerial apparatus operations.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: IFSTA Aerial Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook, 2nd Edition

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I, or member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977 and legally licensed to drive emergency apparatus. Proof must be submitted with the application. Candidates for certification to this level must be in possession of a Connecticut Driver's license with a "Q" Endorsement, a Class A or B Commercial Driver's license (CDL) or shall provide proof that the Driving/Operating requirements of NFPA Standard 1002, Chapter 4, have been satisfactorily completed.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$290.00

Aerial Strategies and Tactics

This course will cover, in detail, general aerial safety issues, rescue priorities, ventilation operations, elevated master streams and general aerial use in both emergency and non-emergency situations. Topics include: basic tactical options for aerial use and limitations, apparatus placement, stabilization systems, and elevation. Students will review the major responsibilities of an aerial apparatus operator including; positioning, spotting, and staging apparatus for incident operations.

Hands-on exercises will reinforce recommended safe practices in the areas of raising, rotating and extending an aerial device, ladder tip placement for various situations and operating aerial master streams.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; or have been a member of a Fire Department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$90.00

Basic Pump Operation

This course examines the components and controls used in the operation of a fire pump. The internal parts of a fire pump are examined with the goal of having the student fully understand how the fire pump moves water. Pump panel controls are discussed in relation to the specific function and use of each device. The process and specific functions involved in drafting and hydrant operations are explained in detail. Students will practice setting up for pumping operations. Participants will learn how to determine and overcome friction loss, how to calculate theoretical pump pressure and how to apply easy-to-use "rule of thumb" principles of relay pumping, operating handlines, supplying sprinklers and standpipe systems. On the training ground each student will apply practical applications while flowing water at prescribed pressures.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; or have been a member of a Fire Department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$90.00

Pump Operator

This course is designed to prepare the student for the practical skills and written examinations for Pump Operator certification. Class work will include: safe driving techniques, preventive maintenance, pump operations, hydraulic calculations, water supply and apparatus systems. The course begins inside the classroom and ends outside with pumping apparatus. The main emphasis is on "hands-on" exercises using various types of pumps, hose sizes and nozzles. This course alone is not designed to produce expert pump operators. Students must apply the basics learned from this course with continued hands-on practical applications with apparatus in their departments to build and maintain proficiency in pump apparatus operations.

Full protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: IFSTA Pumping Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook, 2nd Edition; and the IFSTA Pumping Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook Study Guide.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Certified Firefighter I or a member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977, candidates for certification to this level must be in possession of a Connecticut Driver's License with a "Q" endorsement, a Class A or B

Commercial Driver's License (CDL) or shall provide proof that the Driving/Operating requirements of NFPA Standard 1002, Chapter 4, have been satisfactorily completed.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$290.00

Q Endorsement

The Q Endorsement course is designed to prepare the potential fire apparatus operator for the testing requirements established by the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles. This training course will consist of classroom and extensive practical sessions conducted throughout the length of the course culminating with practical testing administered by the Department of Motor Vehicle on the final day of the class. Students should make arrangements to practice pre-trip and driving skills at their own firehouse during non-class hours to be more successful with the DMV administered test.

Topics covered in the classroom portion of the course include: testing requirements; inspection methods; speed and braking distances; night driving; driving and alcohol; emergencies; accidents; and air brakes. Topics covered in the practical portion of the course include: pre-trip inspection; static course; and over the road skills.

Training Prerequisites: Applicants must possess a valid operator's license. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 32 Course Fee: \$300.00

Tanker Shuttle Operations

This class is designed to make the student aware of the importance of pre-planning water sources and operations for rural water supply tanker transfers prior to the need arising. This course covers the following components: safe tanker operations, driving, filling and dumping; compare and contrast tanker design and efficiency; recognizing proper water sources; evaluating and developing proper dump sites; and organizing mutual aid for tanker task force concepts.

These components are met through the following course goals and objectives: identify apparatus requirements for a water shuttle; identify the requirements for setting up a shuttle operation; describe fill and dump site operations for a water shuttle; describe how to evaluate tanker performance; and demonstrate tanker operation in practical evolutions. On the final day of class students will incorporate information given and resources provided to supply a continuous 750 gallon per minute flow rate of water for a minimum of two hours. Successful application of the course information may lead to the enhancement of the ISO rating for your community. Completion of this course allows for student to apply for "Tanker Operator" Certification if currently a certified as a pump operator.

PPE Requirements: Full protective clothing (no SCBA)

Training Prerequisite: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Prerequisite: Firefighter I or continuous member of fire service since prior to

July 1977 and CDL or Q Endorsement License and Certified Pump Operator. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

The Department of Energy & Environmental Protection, Division of Forestry, has special grant funds available to pay for a limited number of the Tanker Shuttle Operations classes. Tanker Shuttle classes will be offered at no charge each year until these grant funds are exhausted. Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$100.00

EMS PROGRAMS

Emergency Medical Responder

The Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) is often the first medically trained person to arrive on scene of an emergency. EMRs provide basic first aid for soft tissue injuries and can assist in childbirth. This 60 plus hour course includes: patient assessment, childbirth, airway and breathing emergencies, cardiac emergencies, CPR and AED, medical emergencies, bleeding and shock, and muscular skeletal injuries. Students must be a minimum of 16 years old. At the conclusion of this program you will be eligible for the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health Exam. The final step in the program is completion of the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) certification exam.

Class Hours: 60 Course Fee: \$500.00

Emergency Medical Technician/Emergency Medical Responder Refresher

This course reviews and refreshes knowledge and skills required for Emergency Medical Technicians/Emergency Medical Responders currently certified according to the latest U.S. DOT EMT/EMR-Basic National Standard Curriculum. Classroom and "hands-on" training will update the EMT/EMR on current practices and confirm skill levels. A review and renewal of Healthcare Provider CPR will be conducted in conformance with the latest JAMA standards through approved programs of the American Heart Association. Written and practical examinations will be conducted in conformance with the policies established by the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Emergency Medical Technician/Emergency Medical Responder. Proof must be submitted with application.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons (AAOS) Emergency Medical Technician Transition Manual.

Class Hours: 32 Course Fee: \$250.00

FIRE OFFICER PROGRAMS

Fire Officer I and II

This course combines both Fire Officer I and II into one comprehensive program for both aspiring and senior officers. Emergency and routine duties will be discussed, along with human resource management, community and government relations, and public education. Students will also cover group behavior issues, employee evaluations, report preparation, pre-fire planning, and inspections. Emergency service delivery skills for both company officers and multiple company supervisors are also covered at length, including exercises in the fire command simulator.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I, NIMS 700, ICS 100, and ICS 200. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: Fire Officer, Principles and Practices 2nd Ed.

Certification Exam Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I, proof must be submitted with the application. Students must pass the Fire Officer I practical and written exam prior to taking the Fire Officer II exam.

Class Hours: 144 Fire Marshal Credit: 63
Course Fee: No Charge, Funding is provided by the FEMA/NFA State Fire Training Grant.

Fire Officer I

Fire Officer I is a comprehensive course designed to strengthen the new or aspiring fire officer's supervisory and leadership skills. Emergency and routine duties of the company officer will be discussed. Oriented to the level of Lieutenant, topics covered in this course include: human resource management, community and government relations, public education, safety, inspection and investigation and emergency service delivery. Students will spend limited time in a fire command simulator during the emergency service delivery section of the course.

Training Prerequisite: Certified Fire Service Instructor I. NIMS 700, ICS 100, ICS 200.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: Fire Officer, Principles and Practices 2nd Edition.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the practical exam and the written exam.

Class Hours: 96 Fire Marshal Credit: 33

Course Fee: \$375.00

Fire Officer II

This course is designed for those fire officers or aspiring officers that need the skills to

supervise multiple companies. Generally, this level involves the management of company supervisors involved in the operational aspects of a fire station. Oriented to the level of Captain, topics covered in this course include: group behavior, employee evaluation, communication skills, report preparation, pre-fire and operational planning, inspections, command of hazardous materials incidents, safety and emergency services delivery. Students will spend limited time in a fire command simulator during the emergency service delivery section of this course.

Training Prerequisites: Fire Officer I.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett: Fire Officer, Principles and Practices 2nd Edition.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer I and Certified Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the practical exam and the written exam.

Class Hours: 80 Fire Marshal Credit: 45
Course Fee: \$350.00

Fire Officer III

Organizational Administration is a non-traditional course offered to individuals currently holding or aspiring to the rank of shift commander or chief officer. It is designed to enhance the skills of the chief officer by providing a group of peers with a progressive learning environment. This semi-independent study course includes a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussion sessions and development of individual projects. Areas covered in the discussions and projects will include human resource management, community relations, administration, inspection and investigation, emergency services delivery and safety. Candidates will be required to identify a mentor of their choosing that will provide support and guidance.

Training Prerequisites: Must meet NFPA 1021-2009 as identified in Chapter 6; Certified Fire Officer II and Fire Service Instructor II. Proof must be submitted with initial application.

Required Text: The reference books used for this course will be the current edition of the Jones and Bartlett Chief Officer Principles and Practices, other text may be recommended in class.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer II and Certified Fire Service Instructor II. Proof must be submitted with initial application.

Certification will be achieved through a project based assessment method, and written examination.

Class Hours: 80 FM Credit: 45
Course Fee: \$475.00

Fire Officer IV

This semi-independent study course consists of a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussion sessions and the development of individual projects. Areas covered in the discussions and projects will focus heavily on human resource management, administration, multi-agency emergency services delivery and safety. Areas specifically covered will include: grievance administration, training and educational goal setting and planning, employee assistance programs, incentive programs, community event planning, long-range planning, and civil disturbance and disaster planning. In order to project a professional image in the classroom, students should wear appropriate attire or their department daily uniform.

Training Prerequisites: Must meet NFPA 1021-2009 as identified in Chapter 7; Certified Fire Officer III. Proof must be submitted with initial application.

Required Text: The reference books used for this course will be the current edition of the Jones and Bartlett Chief Officer Principles and Practices, other text may be recommended in class.

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer III. Proof must be submitted with initial application.

Certification will be achieved through a project based assessment method, and written examination.

Class Hours: 56 FM Credit: 5

Course Fee: \$375.00

Fire Service Instructor I

This course is designed to meet the first level of instructor as identified in the NFPA 1041 standard. Topics covered during the course include: adult learning and communication, understanding performance objectives, evaluation, and methods of instruction. Students will present from a prepared lesson plan. Study and support materials are online. Access to a computer with internet access is mandatory. Homework assignments and formative assessments will be completed and submitted online.

Successful completion of this course will prepare the student to take the Fire Service Instructor I Practical Skills and Written Certification Examinations.

Maximum class size: 18

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter II. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Required Text: IFSTA, Fire and Emergency Services Instructor, 8th Edition

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter II; or have been a member of a Fire Department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the practical exam and the written exam.

Class hours: 48 FM Credit: 32

Course Fee: \$390.00

Fire Service Instructor II

Designed for the Fire Service Instructor I, Fire Service Instructor II is a comprehensive course designed to meet the requirements of NFPA 1041. Topics covered include: managing instructional resources, development of instructional materials, supervising other instructors, and evaluation. Students will complete a project and deliver a 20 minute presentation. Access to a computer with internet access is mandatory. Homework assignments will be completed and submitted online. Study and support materials are online. Formative assessment will be submitted online.

Maximum class size: 18

Training Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with application.

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett Fire Service Instructor: Principles and Practice, 1st Edition

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the practical exam and the written exam.

Class hours: 40 Course Fee: \$300.00

Fire Service Instructor III

This course is designed to meet the third level of instructor as identified in the NFPA 1041 standard. Topics include administration, records, policy, supervising instructors, analysis, evaluation, and program and curriculum development. The course is a blended learning course. Regular class meetings are designed to complement an online learning classroom. Access to a computer with internet access is mandatory. Students are required to complete course work online.

Maximum class size: 18

Training Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor II

Required Text: Fire and Emergency Services Instructor, 8th Ed, IFSTA

Certification Prerequisites: Certified Fire Service Instructor II. Proof must be submitted with application.

Certification will be achieved through a project based assessment and written examination.

Class Hours: Candidates will have 90 days to complete course requirements.

Course Fee: \$185.00

Health and Safety Officer

This course examines the Health and Safety Officer's role with the identification, evaluation and implementation of policies and procedures that affect the health and safety aspects for emergency responders.

Through the use of case studies, small group workshops and instructor facilitation of safety concepts, participants will gain a thorough understanding of risk management; wellness issues; incident safety functions; regulatory requirements and their impact on increasing

the survivability of fire department personnel. This course is designed for individuals who have department level health and safety responsibilities. Attendees should have a working knowledge of ICS, applicable NFPA and OSHA requirements, and responsibility for setting policy for their department on such issues.

Training Prerequisites: None

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Direct Entry

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 24

Course Fee: \$125.00

Incident Safety Officer: Fire Suppression

The goal of this course is to provide students with the knowledge and skills needed to perform the duties of the Incident Safety Officer (ISO) during incident operations and training evolutions.

This course is designed for fire and emergency medical services (EMS) responders who may be designated by the Incident Commander (IC) as an ISO while working within an Incident Command System (ICS). These assignments may occur during firefighting, EMS, special operations type incidents, and training evolutions.

This course is an incident-specific, scenario-oriented course designed to teach students what an ISO needs to know at an incident. The course uses instructor-led discussion, multimedia activities, and small group discussions to convey instructional points.

Training Prerequisites: None

Certification Examination Prerequisites: Certified Fire Officer I, or have been a Fire Officer with a department on or before July 1, 1986. Proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for the certification written exam.

Class Hours: 24

Course Fee: \$125.00

Public Information Officer

This course is designed to instruct participants in the basic methods for establishing and maintaining a positive relationship with the news media. Fire department activities—including public fire education programs, man-made and natural disasters, and emergencies, make developing policies and training for dealing with the news media essential. Discussion topics will cover: public disclosure laws; media relations; and news releases. Participants will learn the basics of preparing news releases, setting up press conferences, and the responsibilities of the Public Information Officer (PIO) at the scene of an emergency.

Students will participate in a mock briefing with reporters from various media sources.

Training Prerequisites: None

Required Text: Jones and Bartlett Media Relations for Public Safety Professionals by Leo M. Brown.

Class Hours: 16 FM Credit: 8
Course Fee: \$150.00

Strategy and Tactics: Bread and Butter Calls

This two-day course takes the experienced fire fighter through the basics of fire ground decision-making. These are the “room and content”, everyday calls that any fire department should be able to control with even limited resources. It teaches the student to formulate an overall strategy, and to then employ the appropriate tactics to support that strategy using time-tested models. In-class scenarios will take place throughout the course to give students opportunities to work a simulated fire incident.

Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$75.00

Strategy and Tactics: Everyday Emergencies

This three-day course takes the firefighter and company officer through the everyday calls that take up the majority of fire service responses. These are the most common calls where the responder deals with the citizens and public the most. These calls are often referred to a “nuisance” calls by first responders but to the occupant or those effected by it, the incident could be a crisis. Common calls involve; utility issues: gas, electric, water; carbon monoxide detector activations; oil burners and heating units; auto accidents and fires; elevator emergencies; dumpster fires; auto fires; automatic alarm activations.

Class Hours: 24 Course Fee: \$90.00

Strategy and Tactics: Fundamentals

This two day course introduces the officer candidate to the philosophy and tools required for leadership decision making during emergencies. Subjects covered will be a review of the National Incident Management System (NIMS), Incident Priorities and Decision making, the basics of fire behavior and building construction, “size-up”, evaluation and assessment as well as the difference between “strategy and tactics” using such tools as Layman’s Tactical Model and RECEO VS, Terpak’s COAL TWAS WEALTHS or Norman’s version COAL WAS WEALTH and offensive versus defensive operations.

Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$60.00

FIREFIGHTING PROGRAM

Fireground Survival

This course on firefighter survival and rapid intervention training uses scenarios based on actual incidents to identify problems encountered, and offers solutions for members in life

threatening situations. Self-rescue procedures, such as low profile ladder egress and personal rope bail-out procedures will give participants options if caught in deteriorating situations. The class will also cover removing members in distress and teach skills to safely do so. Methods of searching for missing firefighters in an open area will also be covered. Class is labor intensive, full protective clothing including SCBA with spare cylinder is required.

Training prerequisite: Firefighter I

Class Hours: 24 Course Fee: \$175.00

Flashover Survival

Flashover Survival begins with a classroom presentation followed by a simulation of a pending flashover in the Connecticut Fire Academy flashover simulator. The flashover simulator offers firefighters the opportunity to observe fire behavior and the signs of an impending flashover in a controlled setting. This training is an experience of a lifetime that could save your life. Students should bring a bottle of water or sport drink to re-hydrate throughout the training.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder. Long pants are required to participate in the flashover live burns. Shorts alone are not acceptable.

The Connecticut Fire Academy will not be responsible for damages to PPE.

Training Prerequisites: Certified Firefighter I; proof must be submitted with the application.

A separate flashover permission slip is required at the time of registration.

Class Hours: 8 FM Credit: 4
Course Fee: \$110.00

Recruit Firefighter



The Recruit Firefighter program is a 14-week residential course that focuses on developing the knowledge, skills, and abilities needed for a new firefighter to perform entry-level tasks under direct supervision. The training consists of theory and practical skills development delivered on an incremental basis that will develop the maximum retention of job knowledge, skill competency, and safe practices. The recruit will establish a strong will for teamwork, company morale, self-discipline, orderliness, precision, and conduct necessary to be a firefighter. At the conclusion of this course, the recruit firefighter will be tested to the Firefighter I and Firefighter II and Hazardous Materials – First Responder Awareness, Operational and WMD.

Course Curriculum: The course covers a broad range of topics that today’s firefighter faces on a daily basis, and includes: A complete curriculum to encompass Firefighter I and II based on the NFPA 1001 – Firefighter Professional Qualifications and NFPA 472 –

Standard of Competence for Hazardous Materials/Weapons of Mass Destruction. In addition, Recruits will experience and train on Health, Wellness, and Fitness, Cultural Diversity, Employee Assistance Programming, Calling the Mayday, So You’re in the Front Seat Today, Reading Smoke at Building Fires, Thermal Imaging for the Fire Service, Basic Pump Operations, Basic Aerial Operations, Introduction to Fire Investigation, Elevator Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Handling Utility Emergencies, Courage to be Safe, Firefighter Safety and Survival, Rapid Intervention Teams and Rescue Awareness (NFPA 1670) and Rescue Core (NFPA 1006).

Residency Requirement: Recruits will reside at the Connecticut Fire Academy during the weekdays throughout the course.

Enrollment: There is a capped enrollment of 50 participants; students who have a current Fire Service employment offer will be given preference, and any other students will be served on a “space-available” basis. If the capped enrollment has been reached, those students whose applications would have exceeded the class size limitation will be given preference in the next scheduled class. There are two (2) classes held per year, one in the spring and one in the fall.

VA Approval: The Recruit Firefighter training program at the Connecticut Fire Academy has been approved for veteran education benefits.

PPE Requirement: Full NFPA 1971 compliant Personal Protective Equipment and SCBA with 2 spare cylinders.

Training Pre-requisites: Training prerequisites and a complete program description are available on the Connecticut Fire Academy web site approximately one month prior to the scheduled start of the recruit class.

Additional Pre-requisites: Must have a valid CPAT card within one (1) year prior to the scheduled Recruit Class start date.

Class Hours: 70 Days – nearly 700 hours of comprehensive training.

Course Fee: \$6,075.00

Course fee includes tuition, student manuals, lodging, breakfast and lunch.

Traffic Incident Management

Course is designed to aid departments that are involved with managing traffic at emergency scenes. The program covers the roles of the emergency responder in traffic control, state statutes, required training, communication guidelines, personal protective clothing and traffic control equipment, determining traffic control zones and practical exercises. Meets or exceeds Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Chapter 6.

Maximum class size: 20.

Training Prerequisite: ICS 100, 200, 700. Must be an active member of a fire department, CERT team, or emergency medical service. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 8 Course Fee: \$60.00

FIRE PREVENTION PROGRAMS

Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I

The goal of the course is to provide the skills and tools necessary to become a Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I. The class will address the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I including: Introduction; Primary Prevention; Identification and Intake; Who Sets Fires and Why, and Interviewing and Intervention Strategies. Students will be introduced to NPFA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I Professional Standard. The individual will learn to conduct an interview with a firesetter and their family using prepared forms and guidelines and who based on recommended practice may determine the need for referral for counseling and/or implement educational intervention strategies to mitigate effects of firesetting behavior.

Course is designed for individuals that have responsibilities related to Juvenile Firesetting Intervention, interviewing, and prevention. The target audience includes practitioners who interact with children who are involved in firesetting and/or arson behavior and their families. In addition to the fire service, professionals from a myriad of fields including Mental Health, Law Enforcement, Education, Counseling Services, and Social Services can benefit from the training.

Training Prerequisites: none

Certification Prerequisite: Direct Entry

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for certification written exam.

Class Hours: 16 FM Credit: 16

Course Fee: \$150.00

Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II

The goal of the course is to provide the skills and tools necessary to become a Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II. The class will address the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II including: Identification and Intake; Coalition Building Support and Management; Budget and Funding; Development of a Juvenile Handbook, Resource Directory, Data Base, and Program Evaluation. Students will be introduced to the NFPA 1035 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist II Professional Standard. The individual will learn to develop and coordinate a child firesetting intervention program and the activities of Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist. The course develops skills including interviewing and assessment, program development, implementation, and evaluation.

Course is designed for individuals that have or will have responsibilities related to the management and/or coordination of a Juvenile Firesetting Intervention program.

Training Prerequisites: Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist I

Class Hours: 16 FM Credit: 8

Course Fee: \$150.00

Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I

This is an entry-level course that will prepare anyone who performs public education duties to present existing programs to all audiences. The course addresses fire prevention activities, the major causes of unintentional injury, characteristics of learning, evaluation of lesson plans, presentation methods, effective usage of audiovisual aids, successfully dealing with the media and recordkeeping. This course meets the requirements of NFPA 1035, "Professional Qualifications for Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I". Reference material is required for the class.

Training Prerequisites: None

Required Texts: IFSTA Fire and Life Safety Educator 3rd Edition. Masters of Disaster Lesson plans K-2, 3-5 and 6-8. Optional References: Sparkles the Fire Safety Dog, Sparkles the Fire Safety Dog (audio book) and The Great Fire by Jim Murphy.

Certification testing time: requires an additional date for certification written exam.

Class Hours: 32 FM Credit: 24

Course Fee: \$250.00

HAZARDOUS MATERIAL PROGRAMS

Hazardous Materials courses provided by the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control are delivered with assistance from the State Emergency Response Commission and the United States Department of Transportation, Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration.

RESCUE PROGRAMS

NOTE: The programs listed in the calendar as Rescue Technician are currently being up-dated to the latest NFPA 1006 standard. Therefore the class description, contact hours, and course fee are subject to change. When available, updates will be posted on the DESPP/CFPC website.

Cold Water Rescue

This course is designed for first responders operating at the scene of a cold water or ice rescue. Topics covered include: pre-planning, risk assessment, ice types and how they form, hypothermia, cold water drowning, incident size-up, water rescue equipment, and rescue operations. Participants will perform simulated water and ice (if available) rescues using cold water entry suits and associated equipment.

Training Prerequisites: None

Class Hours: 16 Course Fee: \$75.00

Rescue Technician – Confined Space

This course will train students to perform technician level confined space rescue operations. The training objectives meet NFPA 1006 and OSHA 1910.146. Students will learn to preplan, evaluate atmospheres and use protective equipment related to confined spaces, implement and terminate an incident management system for confined space. Students will exercise their previous knowledge for victim management and rope rescue techniques to remove a victim from a confined space. The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisites: Rescue Technician Core and Hazardous Materials Operational; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and a minimum of EMR certification.

For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for the certification written and practical exams.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$465.00

Rescue Technician – Core

This course is designed to meet the job performance requirements in chapter 5 of NFPA 1006 Rescue Technician. Students will learn the basics of site operations, size-up, resource management, hazard/risk assessment, ground support for helicopter operations and incident management as it relates to the rescue environment. Students will learn skills to use rope-rescue equipment to manage victims, anchor-rope systems, build and operate lowering and hauling systems in a low angle environment. Students will also be able to inspect and maintain related rescue equipment.

This program is a prerequisite for all technical rescue certification courses.

The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisite: Firefighter I and Haz Mat Operational

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Minimum EMR; proof must be submitted with the application.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$420.00

Rescue Technician – Rope

This program will train the students to perform technician level rope rescue to the NFPA 1006 Rescue Technician standard. The training will focus on rescue situations in the high-angle environment. The students will identify and construct anchoring systems, rappel and belay lines, lowering and hauling mechanical advantage systems, and tensioned highlines.

The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet and footwear.

Training Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and a minimum of EMR certification; proof must be submitted with the application. For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Class Hours: 56 Course Fee: \$550.00

Rescue Technician – Trench

This program will train the students to perform technician level trench rescue. The training objectives meet NFPA 1006 and OSHA 1926. Students will evaluate trenches and soil conditions; will learn to shore unprotected straight and intersecting trenches with both community and pneumatic shoring. They will also use supplemental shoring when needed. Students develop an action plan to manage and remove a victim from a trench accident.

The PPE requirements are a protective helmet, footwear, gloves, eye protection, and work clothes.

Training prerequisites: Rescue Technician Core and Hazardous Materials Operational; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and a minimum of EMR certification; proof must be submitted with the application.

For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for certification written and practical exam.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$490.00

Rescue Technician – Vehicle and Machinery

This program meets the requirements of Chapter 10 of the Rescue Technician Professional Qualifications standard. Through classroom sessions and hands-on application you will plan for vehicle/machinery incidents, establish scene safety zones, establish fire protection, perform required stabilization, isolate potentially harmful energy sources, determine and create access and egress points, disentangle victims, remove a packaged victim and terminate the incident. Completion of this program and the Rescue Technical CORE program that covers Chapter 5 of the 1006 standard will allow you to take the certification examination for Vehicle and Machinery Rescue Technician.

Full protective Clothing (no SCBA) required.

Training Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core; proof must be submitted with the application.

Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and a minimum of EMR

certification; proof must be submitted with the application. For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required.

Certification testing time: requires additional dates for certification written and practical exam.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$465.00

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

ADVANCED SKILLS AND CONCEPTS

The Advanced Skills and Concepts (ASAC) Session of Introduction to the Fire Service (ITFS) is open to graduates of a previous ITFS Session who are between 16 & 17 years old. A six-day, residential program, ASAC hosts a smaller group of students and delves into much more technical information and skills. ASAC students will review some of the skills learned in their first ITFS class and then will learn about and practice skills in Technical Rescue, Vehicle Extrication, Advanced Engine Company Operations, Pump Operations and Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus. ASAC students will receive training in radio communications, leadership, fireground rehabilitation and teaching methodology. Students will put all of their new skills together – including operating engine company pump panels – in a very challenging simulated incident on graduation day. ASAC was designed with the goal of producing a successful graduate who is prepared to assume a leadership role in their Junior or Explorer Post. In addition to the new material and skills they learn over the course of ASAC, graduates will be able to develop and deliver a company-level drill.

A special application is required to register for this class.

Prerequisite: Graduate of Introduction to the Fire Service. Full protective clothing including helmet, bunker coat, gloves, boots, bunker pants, and eye protection is required for this program. Students applying for this class must be affiliated with an organized fire department.

Class Hours: 6 days. Max class size 20 students.

Course Fee: TBA

Command and Control of Incident Operations

In this six day course, officers are introduced to the Incident Command System (ICS) and they study proper fire command techniques for control and extinguishment of fires ranging from small, residential structures to multi-occupancy, commercial complexes.

Topics covered include problem-solving and fire command, interagency and mutual aid,

the ICS, incident management, size up and strategy, tactics and action plans, truck company operations, engine company operations, building construction and fire behavior, pre-incident preparation, incident organization, and strategic command. Special emphasis is placed on firefighter safety.

This course is appropriate for Chief Officers or company officers who have command responsibilities at emergency incidents. Additionally, officers who are upwardly mobile in their organizations may be considered.

Applicants should have the following prerequisite training: ICS 100 level and ICS 200 level training. Preferred courses are Q462 and Q463 available through NFA Online at www.nfaonline.dhs.gov. Chief's signature attests that the applicant has completed this required training.

Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$120.00

Command and General Staff Functions for Local Incident Management Teams

This five day course is activity concentrated and designed to better prepare emergency response personnel to manage large, complex incidents effectively by using the functional components of the Incident Command System under the National Incident Management System (NIMS).

This course is appropriate for Fire, EMS, Law Enforcement, Public Works and Public Health personnel that are, or may be, assigned to an organized Local Incident Management Team with the purpose of improving their ability to manage an incident requiring a significant number of resources from multiple disciplines and/or mutual-aid.

Training Prerequisites: NIMS 700, ICS 100, ICS 200. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 40 Fire Marshal Credit:
Course Fee: No Charge

Funding for this course is provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation, Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Program Training Grant

Introduction to the fire service

The Introduction to the Fire Service (ITFS) Program is an intensive, six-day residential program for High School students with an interest in firefighting to be totally immersed in the organization, culture and practical skills of the Fire Service. Students are issued uniforms, are assigned into squads and work together in exciting practical evolutions throughout the week. A small group of hand-picked instructors teach students proven fireground methods for performing engine, ladder and rescue company functions. All of these skills will ultimately be put together in a realistic fireground simulation on graduation day. ITFS students will participate in morning physical fitness sessions and will work in turnout gear as they deploy and operate hoselines, carry, raise and climb

ground ladders and search for victims in low-visibility environments. ITTFS places a major emphasis on character, teamwork, self-discipline and mutual respect – all hallmarks of the Fire Service. Guest speakers from various backgrounds within the Fire Service share their experience with students to provide the ‘big picture’ of the many opportunities within the trade.

Uniforms, water bottles and meals are provided. Students will be assigned and will be responsible for the condition of their own private room with private bath.

If you are a high school student between 14 and 17, are a Fire Department Cadet, Explorer or Junior Member and are interested in learning more about the Fire Service and sharing in an experience that hundreds of graduates have described as “the best week of my life”, fill out an application for the Introduction To The Fire Service Program!

Prerequisite: Full protective clothing including helmet, bunker coat, gloves, boots, bunker pants, and eye protection is required for this program. Students applying for this class must be affiliated with an organized fire department.

A special application is required to register for this class.

Leadership I for Fire and EMS: Strategies for Company Success

This two day course presents the company officer with the basic leadership skills and tools needed to perform effectively in the fire service environment. The course includes techniques and approaches to problem-solving, ways to identify and assess the needs of the company officer’s subordinates, methods for running meetings effectively in the fire service environment, and decision making skills for the company officer.

This course is appropriate for line fire officers, unit commanders, or program supervisors. Fire or rescue personnel due for promotion/appointment to officer rank or supervisory position, training officers, staff, or administrative officers of fire and rescue organizations should also consider this course.

Leadership II for Fire and EMS: Strategies for Personal Success

This two day course provides the company officer with the basic leadership skills and tools needed to perform effectively in the fire service environment. The course addresses ethics, use and abuse of power at the company officer level, creativity in the fire service environment, and management of the multiple roles of the company officer.

This course is appropriate for line fire officers, unit commanders, or program supervisors. Fire or rescue personnel due for promotion/appointment to officer rank or supervisory position, training officers, staff, or administrative officers of fire and rescue organizations should also consider this course.

Leadership III for Fire and EMS: Strategies for Supervisory Success

This 2-day course provides the company officer with the basic leadership skills and tools to perform effectively in the fire service environment. The course covers when and how to delegate to subordinates, assess personal leadership styles through situational leadership, discipline subordinates, and apply coaching/ motivating techniques.

This course is appropriate for line fire officers, unit commanders, or program supervisors. Fire or rescue personnel due for promotion/appointment to officer rank or supervisory position, training officers, staff, or administrative officers of fire and rescue organizations should also consider this course.

Solar Photovoltaic Systems

Program provides an overview of solar photovoltaic electrical systems, reviews required permits, plans, wiring, attachment and equipment details. Program highlights key inspection points with focus on sections of the 2011 edition of NEC Article 690 – Solar Photovoltaic (PV) Systems. Also included is an overview of the PV System requirements covered in the ICC based State Building Code. Photovoltaic Systems of less than 10kw, with public utility interaction, will be the primary emphasis. Participants will gain the knowledge of common Code violations associated with PV systems. Participants will leave with the knowledge and confidence required to effectively inspect a PV system for Code compliance. Course developed by the International Association of Electrical Inspectors (IAEI)

Instructor: Christopher Warfel PE, a principal of Entech Engineering, a Solar Photovoltaic System firm on Block Island. Mr. Warfel is credentialed under IAEI and New York State Energy Research and Development Authority. Mr. Warfel has extensive experience with PV building inspector and code official training.

Continuing Education Credits: The Office of Education and Data Management has pre-approved for 8.0 hours of credit hours for Connecticut Building Officials in attendance for the entire event. Education Data Tracking cards will be scanned at the class conclusion.

CPAT Orientation & Physical Conditioning

The Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT) consists of eight separate events. CPAT is a sequence of events requiring you to progress along a predetermined path from event to event in a continuous manner. The events include: Stair Climb, Hose Drag, Equipment Carry, Ladder Raise and Extension, Forcible Entry, Maze Search, Victim Drag and Ceiling Breach and Pull. This test was developed to allow fire departments to obtain pools of trainable candidates who are physically able to perform essential job tasks on the fire scene. This is a pass/fail test based on a validated maximum total time of 10 minutes and 20 seconds.

During the events, you wear a 50-pound vest to simulate the weight of a self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and firefighter protective clothing, a helmet and gloves. An additional 25 pounds, using two 12.5-pound weights which simulate a high-rise pack (hose bundle), is added to your shoulders for the stair climb event only. Throughout all events, you must wear long pants, footwear with no open heel or toe, a provided hard hat with chinstrap, and provided work gloves. Watches and loose or restrictive jewelry are not permitted.

All props are designed to obtain the necessary information regarding your physical ability. The tools and equipment were chosen to provide the highest level of consistency, safety and validity in measuring your physical abilities. The events and distances between events are always the same.

The events are placed in a sequence that best simulates fire scene events while allowing an 85-foot walk between events. To ensure the highest level of safety and to prevent exhaustion, no running is allowed between events. This walk intentionally allows you approximately 20 seconds to recover and regroup before each event.

The history of Candidate Physical Ability Testing in Connecticut has shown beyond a doubt that preparation is the key to success. CPAT is extremely demanding. CPAT tests your strength, agility, balance and ability to follow directions while under physical and emotional stress. Many have made the error in believing they can pass without proper preparation. The Connecticut Fire Academy is required to offer detailed Orientations and two Practice Tests prior to the administration of CPAT. The orientations include a review of all materials within the Candidate Guide booklet. More importantly, the orientations give the candidate the opportunity to perform a self-evaluation by physically reviewing and using the same equipment used in the testing process. The Practice Tests allow candidates to run the test course under timed conditions. If the Practice Test is conducted under "CPAT Conditions" and the candidate passes, it will be counted as passing CPAT. Attending the orientations and practice tests is highly recommended.

To allow for the required eight week CPAT preparatory period as well as the time to process the CPAT applications, a deadline has been established for registering for both the spring and fall testing cycles. Applications received after the published deadline will not be accepted and you will not be able to test during that CPAT testing cycle. Those who have been accepted into the CPAT testing process will receive a packet with information on the testing process and the CPAT Waiver Form that lists the dates and times for their orienta-

tions, practice tests and the CPAT test. If you do not receive a CPAT packet during the two weeks following the application deadline, it is your responsibility to contact the Connecticut Fire Academy within thirty days of the application deadline to verify you are registered and that we have your proper mailing address. Inquiries made after the thirty day time period will not be acted on and you will not be allowed to participate in that CPAT testing cycle.

Please refer to our website at www.ct.gov/cfpc for a listing of the CPAT application deadlines and to download the current CPAT Application form. It is also highly recommended that you download and review the Candidate Preparation Guide and the Candidate Orientation Guide.

The CPAT testing fee is \$150.00 of which \$50 is a non-refundable processing fee. Registered candidates who wish to withdraw from the CPAT testing process must do so in writing to the CPAT Program Manager. The written request for a refund of the CPAT testing fee (minus the \$50 processing fee) must be received at the Connecticut Fire Academy at least one day prior to the candidate's first scheduled orientation. Requests for refunds received on or after the candidate's first orientation date will not be considered.

CPAT Cancellations by the Connecticut Fire Academy

CPAT may be cancelled due to a number of conditions affecting testing. The main reason for cancellation is adverse weather. The weather can be very unpredictable, do not rely on your local weather reports, as the conditions may be different at the test site. It is highly recommended that you call 877-528-3473 (in state), (860) 627-6363 (out of state) extension 415 Prior to traveling to the testing site. There will be a prerecorded message stating that the test is either running or has been cancelled. Unfortunately, the test can be cancelled at the last minute. If you are traveling a long distance we encourage you to call extension 415 several times during your travel.

If the CPAT test is cancelled the message on extension 415 will state how and or when you will be notified of the rescheduled CPAT test date.

Except for test cancellations as indicated above your assigned practice tests and CPAT test will not be rescheduled for any reason.

2014 CPAT SCHEDULE

The Connecticut Fire Academy offers a spring and fall testing cycle. It is important to understand that all orientations, practice tests, and CPAT tests are based on two application deadlines. Applications must be received by the application deadline to be registered for that testing cycle. The 2014 application deadlines are March 6, 2014 for the spring testing cycle and July 31, 2014 for the fall testing cycle.

Candidates will be sent a packet containing their assigned orientations, practice tests, and CPAT test dates and times approximately two weeks after the application deadline.



NATIONAL PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATIONS STANDARDS

The State of Connecticut Commission on Fire Prevention and Control is pleased to offer Fire Service Certification to the members of Connecticut's fire service. Certification is an excellent means by which an individual may measure his/her knowledge, skills, and abilities against a national standard and that of their peers.

As indicated below, the Commission currently offers 40 levels of certification. The National Fire Protection Association Professional Qualifications Standard against which the examination is based is noted below. The Commission has adopted the most current edition of the noted Standards as the Standards for Certification.

The certification examination process for each level consists of a written or oral examination and a practical skills examination. The levels of Firefighter I and Firefighter II also require verification of live fire suppression activities.

All of the Commission's Certification levels have been accredited by the National Board on Fire Service Professional Qualifications and the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress.

This summary is designed to provide an overview of the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control's Certification Process. For more detailed information, including the specific examination requirements for each level, please contact the Certification Division at 860-627-6363.

INDEMNIFICATION OF INSTRUCTORS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Section 7-323q of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (Effective October 1, 2010):

The state shall save harmless and indemnify any person certified as a fire service instructor by the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control under section 7-323l from financial loss and expense, including legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of alleged negligence or other act resulting in personal injury or property damage, which acts are not wanton, reckless or malicious, provided such person, at the time of the acts resulting in such injury or damage, was acting in the discharge of such person's duties (1) as an employee or member of a municipal, state or tribal nation fire department to provide fire service training and instruction for the other members or employees of such municipal, state or tribal nation fire department, (2) as a fire service instructor employed by said commission to provide fire service training and instruction on behalf of said commission, or (3) as a fire service instructor employed by a regional fire school to provide fire service training and instruction on behalf of such school.

The Training Division of the State of Connecticut Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection/Commission on Fire Prevention and Control has streamlined the process by which individuals may participate in certain training programs by eliminating as training prerequisites certification examination requirements. The responsibility for ensuring that individuals are qualified to participate in a certification examination now shifts from the Training Registrar to the individual certification candidate. Candidates for Certification are now personally required to ensure that they have met all prerequisites prior to submitting an examination application and are required to submit any required documentation prior to the examination. Failure to do so will result in rejection of the examination application.

Additionally, State of Connecticut Regulations require that all candidates for certification be 18 years of age at the time of the examination and that candidates for certification be a member of a fire department with the exception of Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I and II, Juvenile Firesetter, Intervention Specialist, Health and Safety Officer, which allow direct entry into those levels.

CERTIFICATION DIVISION

ACCOMMODATIONS FOR CANDIDATES WITH LEARNING/READING DISABILITIES PARTICIPATING IN WRITTEN CERTIFICATION EXAMINATIONS FOR FIREFIGHTER I ONLY

I. General Policy

A. In accordance with Section 7-323I-95 (d) of the Regulation of the State of Connecticut, all examinations and/or components of examinations shall be structured and administered in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The Certification Division will make reasonable accommodations to the known learning/reading disabilities of candidates to the extent feasible. Accommodating the individual handicapped candidate's needs while maintaining the integrity of the certification testing process will be of primary consideration.

II. Reasonable Accommodations

Reasonable accommodations to be made in test administration are specified below in Section V. One or a combination of accommodations may be necessary for individual candidates according to their needs and the requirements of the test material to be presented to them. The Director of Certification may allow other accommodations on a case-by-case basis.

III. Documentation of Handicapping Condition

Each candidate requesting accommodations that effect actual test conditions will be required to furnish documentation of the handicapping condition and the accommodation(s) needed. Documentation must be sent to the Director of Certification. The proper individual examination application form and testing fees must accompany the above documentation. All documentation submitted shall remain confidential.

IV. Testing Location

Administration of examinations for individuals with learning/reading disabilities will be at the offices of the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control in Windsor Locks. At the direction of the Director of Certification, an examination proctor may administer examinations in the field under very strict guidelines.

V. Accommodation Options

The following are the accommodation options which may be afforded to the candidate. Other accommodations may be made available to the candidate based upon the individual needs. The Commission may or may not be fiscally responsible for accommodations made.

- A. Additional time
- B. Individual monitor or special attention to assure the candidate has understood instructions
- C. Oral examination

IV. Exception

The expectation for a first responder will be to read and write in American English at Hazardous Materials incidents. Therefore, no accommodations can be made during any hazardous materials Awareness, Operational or Technician Level cognitive or psychomotor Certification examination.

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
