

Advanced EVOE & Apparatus Safety Training

Course #: 07707 Days: June 4 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 30.00

Emergency responders operating apparatus enroute to and returning from calls continue to suffer death and injury at a near record rate. As if this situation wasn't bad enough, firefighters and EMS personnel are being indicted, arrested and charged with serious crimes as a result of some of these crashes. These members face serious jail time, fines and or loss of employment. This class takes a look at what happened in these cases, what the charges were and what the statutes are here in Connecticut that can be applied in such cases within this state. The class includes a study of the applicable state statutes as well as what would constitute a criminal and / or civil action as a result of emergency vehicle operations.

This class studies the underlying causes of action in these cases and how these factors require a close analysis of vehicle dynamics, speed issues, and roll-over issues. A detailed description air brakes, engine retarders and "Black Boxes" is also included in the class. The class closes with an analysis of the psychology of emergency vehicle operations and how training and attitude affect the drivers of emergency vehicles.

This class is a must for Chief Officers, Fleet Supervisors as well as emergency vehicle operators themselves. Let's take a close look at ourselves and see what we can do about this situation.

Advanced Rapid Intervention Team Skills

Course #:07743 Days: June 4 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 100.00

Advance Rapid Intervention Team Skills is a one-day intensive course that uses scenarios based on past incidents that took firefighter's lives. Safely removing a trapped or unconscious firefighter from a burning building is a labor-intensive operation, students will be able to affect such a rescue in our new RIT Simulator. The simulator adds smoke and heat to the scenarios and tests the team's ability under actual fire conditions. Additional time will be spent reviewing new advancements in RIT. The practical hands-on portion of this training is very intense and strenuous.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder.

Prerequisites: Applicants must have completed Rapid Intervention Training offered by the Connecticut Fire Academy. Proof must accompany application

Course hours: 8

Advanced Vehicle Extrication

Course #: 07701 Days: June 4, 5 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 100.00

This two day program is designed to provide the experienced student with realistic scenarios involving different problematic extrications. The objectives of this class are to provide the student an environment to implement an incident management system at motor vehicle incidents, along with contemporary extrication and stabilization techniques. Vehicles will be in compromising positions providing students with challenging scenarios.

Topics covered include: hazard assessment and stabilization; victim removal; developing a "Team" concept; vehicle assessment and scene safety.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing (no SCBA).

Agriculture Response Training

America not only feeds itself but a good portion of the world. That food is produced and processed by the American food and agriculture industry, one of the largest by any measurement, in the world. And, sadly, that industry is a potential target for a chemical or biological act of terrorism or a natural disaster that could seriously damage our economy. It is anticipated that an act of Agterror will require the response of local fire departments using their staffing to assist in containment and disposal efforts.

With that threat in mind, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security awarded a grant to the Community Training and Preparedness Center at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The AgTerror Preparedness Center is the only one of its kind and focus in America.

This intense one day course is designed to not just train the individual participant, but also provide information, materials and support necessary to return to their discipline and disseminate information to coworkers or provide additional training opportunities. The course is divided into modules centered on an overall scenario involving a foot and mouth disease (FMD) outbreak. These modules include an introduction to agro terrorism, quarantine, PPE, euthanasia and disposal, and cleaning and disinfecting. All modules are based on current DHS and USDA guidelines and reviewed regularly for accuracy.

Representatives from the AgTerror Preparedness Center will deliver this informative training.

Basic and Hazmat Metering

Course #: 07705 Days: June 4 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 30.00

Many communities have received a metering package from the Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security that on the surface may seem to be overwhelming to use. The Basic Metering Package supplied to most communities, including the Scott Scout 4-Gas, the MiniRae PID, the Ludlum Model 3 and the SAIC personal dosimeter will be covered in the morning module. The HAZMAT Meter Package including the APD2000, the M256A1 kit and the Drager CMS/CDS kits will be covered in the afternoon module.

Additionally, participants will be able to understand the dual metering approach and conversion factors that are needed to be performed when monitoring atmospheres that are different from the calibration gas.

This program will provide the user with an overview of the Basic Metering Package and Hazmat Metering Package that allows them to utilize these tools as part of their everyday response. To allow more hands-on experience participants are urged to bring their fully charged meters, providing their department can support the meters being out of service for the duration of the class.

Basic Pump Operation and Hydraulics

Course #: 07730 Days: June 7, 8 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 60.00

This basic program examines the components and controls in the operation of a fire pump. The internal parts of a fire pump are examined with the goal of having the student fully understand how the fire pump moves water. Pump panel controls are discussed in relation to the specific function and use of each device. The process and specific functions involved in drafting and hydrant operations are explained in detail. Students will practice setting up for pumping operations.

Participants will learn how to determine and overcome friction loss, how to calculate theoretical pump pressure and how to apply easy-to-use "rule of thumb" principles of relay pumping, operating handlines, supplying sprinklers and standpipe systems. On the training ground, students will apply practical applications while flowing water at prescribed pressures.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing (no SCBA).

Calling the Mayday

Course #: 07726 Days: June 7 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 50.00

What are the Mayday decision parameters for firefighters? How do we teach the Mayday decision-making process to firefighters? How much Mayday practice do firefighters need?

This eight hour National Fire Academy hand-off training course focuses on the ins and outs of firefighters calling a Mayday. It requires the instructors to certify that the students have met the psychomotor skills requirement to call a Mayday over their radio system. The firefighter must demonstrate the ability to call Mayday under various emergency situations a firefighter may find himself/herself in. The minimum: being trapped or lost in a room, having something collapse on him/her such as a ceiling, being stuck or caught on something such as wires, and falling through a floor or roof. These conditions must be simulated using props with the firefighter in full PPE, SCBA, and portable radio in a blacked-out face mask. The firefighter must send the Mayday call using whatever method is authorized by the authority having jurisdiction. The Mayday call must be received over the radio system; the firefighters information must be repeated correctly and acknowledged by the firefighter. The firefighter must perform these skills at the master level, meaning 100 percent correct.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required. Student should bring a bottle of water or sport drink to re-hydrate throughout the training.

Courage to be Safe.. So Everyone Goes Home and National Firefighter Near-Miss Reporting System

Course #: 07715 Days: June 5 Time: 1:00 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 10.00

“The Courage to be Safe” Program – New Initiative

Developed in conjunction with the Life Safety Initiatives project by Chiefs Billy Goldfeder, (Loveland-Simms) John Salka, (FDNY) and Rich Anderson (Anderson Manning Media Group), the LODD prevention-reduction program entitled “The Courage to Be Safe... So Everyone Goes Home” outlines the history of the Life Safety Initiatives and examines Line of Duty Deaths both in Connecticut and nationally. A key part of the program is untold story of LODD survivors, revealing the pain and heartbreak the loss of a firefighter brings and illustrating that the consequences of an LODD are a family affair in every sense of the word.

“National Fire Fighter Near-Miss Reporting System” – Ongoing Initiative

The National Fire Fighter Near-Miss Reporting System www.firefighternearmiss.com was created to turn near-miss experiences into lessons learned for everyone in the fire service community. Lessons learned from near-miss experiences seldom make it past a firehouse kitchen table. Today, a lesson learned in one firehouse can be shared with fire departments across the country through the virtual firehouse kitchen table, the National Fire Fighter Near-Miss Reporting System.

This class will review the goal of the National Fire Fighter Near-Miss Reporting System which is to improve firefighter safety by collecting, sharing and analyzing near-miss experiences. The reporting system is voluntary, confidential, non-punitive and secure. The reporting system collects information that can assist in formulating strategies to reduce the number of firefighter injuries and fatalities.

“National Firefighter Safety Stand Down 2007” – Ongoing Initiative

June 17-23, 2006 is the date set to kickoff this year’s National Firefighter Safety Stand Down, an initiative intended to refocus attention on reducing line of duty deaths and injuries to firefighters. This year’s theme is “Ready to Respond” focusing on proper training, preparation and equipment before a call. This presentation will provide participants with sample agendas, initiative ideas, and discussion points for fire department members.

This half day session will introduce participants to a new firefighter safety initiative and review two ongoing firefighter safety initiatives.

Discipline and Conflict Resolution

Course #: 07704 Days: June 4 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 20.00

A full day program for company officers and shift commanders that reviews the reasons for disciplinary action, steps in progressive discipline, reason why people avoid discipline and the key considerations in performing a disciplinary interview. In addition, sources of conflict and strategies for resolving conflict will be covered.

Emergency Vehicle Operator EVOC

Course #: 07729 Days: June 7 Time: 1:00 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 20.00

This basic half day program is designed for the apparatus driver to increase skills and knowledge of defensive driving techniques. This presentation will cover: driver training; driver selection; driver and vehicle readiness; Connecticut driving laws; and roadway problems. This program will consist of a classroom discussion on what it takes to be a responsible apparatus driver. Topics will include: legal issues; accident prevention programs; and analyzing actual traffic scenarios.

Engine Company Operations From the firehouse to the fire floor

Course #: 07710 Days: June 5, 6 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 150.00

This grass root course will cover engine company operations in stretching and operating the critical first line and all the positions of the first due engine. The responsibilities of the engine officer before, during, and after a working fire will be covered. There will be an in depth look at the nozzleman duties of stretching, advancing and operating the nozzle. The instructors will stress the importance of a well-trained backup man on the first line. The course will also cover the chauffeurs’ position and the doorman position. Time will be spent describing simple tools any well trained engine firefighter should carry during everyday activities and how the nozzle team should react to different fire ground emergencies. The success of every operation depends on a well-trained determined company. This back to basics no nonsense course will take you through the right steps to complete this mission. The second day of this class is spent in a class A burn building attacking live fires.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be Certified Firefighter I
Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder is required.

Course hours: 16

Engineering Class A & B Fire Streams

Course #: 07742 Days: June 8 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 30.00

This class is a seven-hour, non commercial view of water and firefighting foam’s interaction with both class A and B fuels.

This dual track program is designed for fire officers, driver engineers and Haz-Mat technicians who have a need to better understand the applied physics and chemistry of developing proper class A & B foam streams.

Classroom presentations followed by exterior demonstrations will concentrate on flows from 12 GPM to 1000+ GPM. Presentation will include an in-depth operational overview of the State of Connecticut Regional Foam Trailers and the AR-AFFF foam that is used in the trailers. Three new trailers have been added in the State this year providing denser coverage and the need for more trained operators.

Presenter is Jim Cottrell of Cottrell Associates, Inc. Jim Cottrell is a thirty year veteran of the of the Firefighting business. He is Chairman of IFSTA’s Foam Training Manual Committee he serves on their Driver-Operator and Fire Streams Committees. Jim is associated with Underwriters Laboratories on their Foam Standards Technical Panel and manages National Foam and Task Force Tips municipal distribution and product development in their eastern states markets.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing (no SCBA).

Evidence Preservation at the Fire Scene

Course #: 07714	Days: June 5	Time: 1:00 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 10.00
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Fire suppression forces and first responders can perform vital life safety and property conservation efforts while maintaining a high level of viable scene evidence if they are aware of some basic concepts. This training is designed to introduce the fire suppression forces to the team concept of fire investigation and offer the fire officer some options that may aid the fire investigators during their investigation. Topics that will be covered include arson awareness, the Fire Investigator's responsibility to the Incident Commander, and the four basic firefighter functions regarding evidence preservation during fire investigations: observation, recognition, preservation, and notification. Potential students should be aware that photographs for the content of portions of this program are from actual investigations and may be graphic in nature.

Firefighter Safety and Survival

Course #: 07711	Days: June 5, 6	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 95.00
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This is an intensive two-day course on firefighter survival training. Using scenario based real-life incidents, this course identifies problems that were encountered, and offers possible solutions for the safe and efficient removal of members in distress. Safely removing a trapped or unconscious firefighter from a burning building can be a labor-intensive operation. Self-rescue procedures, such as low profile ladder egress, and personal rope bail-out procedures will give the participant options if caught in a rapidly deteriorating situation.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be a Certified Firefighter I. Proof must be submitted with application.

Firefighter Training Props

Course #: 07734	Days: June 8	Time: 8:30 - 12:00	Fee: \$ 20.00
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This class takes a no-nonsense look at the needs and advantages of firefighting training props and simulators. Training props can save training budget dollars and give the major advantage of providing a renewable resource for many evolutions. Props are generally made of readily available building and construction supplies which may be new or used. Firefighter confidence and skills can be increased on site at the fire training ground without the need to "acquire" structures. Firefighter Training Props can be developed to increase firefighter skills in vertical ventilation, forcible entry, hand tool usage, power tool discipline, SCBA confidence and many others only limited by the designer's imagination.

Fitness for Firefighters

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This second year program has expanded to eight hours to more thoroughly cover the most important topic of our era: Firefighter fitness and wellness. We will present the building blocks for the basic understanding of motivation, physical fitness assessments, program design, exercise modalities, and nutrition, and will conclude with a creative and dynamic hands-on firehouse workout routine.

Students are required to be cleared to participate in a fire service fitness class, and to bring a water bottle and comfortable clothing suitable for exercise.

Flashover Simulator

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Course #: 07733	Days: June 8	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 95.00
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Flashover is the stage of a fire in which all combustible material in a room or other confined area simultaneously ignites marking the fire transition from growth to fully developed and causing complete destruction. Flashover Survival training begins with a classroom presentation followed by a real world simulation of pending flashover in the Connecticut Fire Academy flashover simulator. The flashover simulator offers firefighters the opportunity to observe fire behavior and the signs that lead to the flashover phenomenon in a controlled setting. This training is an experience of a lifetime that could save you life.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required. Student should bring a bottle of water or sport drink to re-hydrate throughout the training.

Note: students are required to wear full length pants, no short allowed.

The Connecticut Fire Academy will not be responsible for damages to PPE.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be Certified Firefighter I

A separate flashover permission slip is required at time of registration.

Forcible Entry

Course #: 07702	Days: June 4	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 65.00
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This dynamic program, taught by Captain Robert Morris of Rescue 1 FDNY, consists of both a classroom session and hands-on scenarios. The classroom covers the types of doors and lock hardware that the firefighter is likely to encounter, how to size up the forcible entry situation, and how best to attack the lock. Methods range from the standard method of using a set of irons to through the lock techniques. After the classroom all students will get their opportunity to practice forcing various locks utilizing the methods discussed in the classroom. Captain Morris has presented this program throughout the country.

Handling Elevator Emergencies

Course #: 07725	Days: June 7,8	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 125.00
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This course is designed for the trained professionals that respond to emergencies involving stalled elevators. Emergency personnel with inadequate training in “Handling Elevator Emergencies” are exposed to an increased risk of injury or death to both the victim and themselves. This comprehensive course will provide emergency responders with intensive classroom and hands-on training on how to safely and effectively remove passengers from stalled elevators.

Topics include: nomenclature, safety, how an elevator functions, construction, outside hoists, elevator safety devices, possible equipment needed, initial response steps, restarting a stalled elevator, lock/out – tag/out procedures, elevator doors, use of hoistway door keys/pick tools, poling, removal of passengers from stalled elevators, fireman service (phase 1/phase2),

This course features a dynamic PowerPoint presentation accompanied by realistic hands-on skill stations. The combination of the picture filled PowerPoint program and state-of-the-art props, built from actual elevator and escalator parts, enable the presenters to bring the elevator to the classroom. 8 hours is spent in the classroom/skill stations. Day 2 Incorporates a 4 hour rope program, given by Lt. Charlie Schmid (FDNY/Sq.41-ret.) and 4 hours performing victim removals w/ the elevator stuck between floors. In addition, new elevator door pick tools and a poling device (designed by the lead instructor) will be introduced and demonstrated. Course instructors: Michael A. Dragonetti & Andy Werkhoven. Portions of this class will be held offsite from the Fire Academy. Full protective clothing (no SCBA) is required.

Holmatro Rescue Equipment

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This program is designed not only to provide knowledge of hydraulic rescue tools, but also to apply knowledge in hands-on auto extrication situations. Safe operation of some of the newest equipment that is in use in Connecticut will be demonstrated. Instructors for this program include Holmatro representatives, service personnel, and Connecticut Fire Academy Instructors who have been trained in the use of Halmatro hydraulic rescue equipment. Topics include: facts about hydraulic rescue tools; problem solving; field maintenance; proper applications and safe operation.

Holmatro representative will provide a Vehicle Extrication Techniques booklet to each attendee.

Full Protective clothing (No SCBA) is required.

Hurst Extrication Equipment

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This program is designed to provide knowledge in the use of the Hurst Tool and how to apply the knowledge in auto extrication situations. Safe operation of the oldest and newest equipment in Connecticut will be demonstrated. Instructors for this program include representatives from the Hurst Tool Manufacturer, repair personnel, and Connecticut Fire Academy faculty who have been trained by Hurst Emergency Products Division of the Hale Product, Inc., Group. Topics covered include facts about the tool, problem solving, field maintenance, proper applications and safe operation. This program will include both classroom information and hands-on practical skills training with vehicles.

Participants are required to bring full protective clothing (no SCBA).

I-CALL/I-TAC Interoperability Training Program

Course #: 07737	Days: June 5	Time: 1:00 - 4:30	Fee: \$ Free
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The Department of Emergency Management, State of Connecticut Radio System Interoperability Committee in cooperation with the Connecticut Fire Academy is presenting this class on the state and national I-CALL/I-TAC mutual aid radio system. The Connecticut Public Safety Interoperability Executive Committee had previously issued handheld 800MHZ radios to all local fire, police, EMS and emergency management departments to help improve on-scene communications between local Unified Commanders. This training program is an update to that program designed to educate users of the statewide I-CALL/I-TAC system, its set-up, procedures and use. This program is designed as a train-the-trainer program for attendees to redeliver this program to their respective organizations.

Equipment Guidance: Each organization that has received a portable radio as a part of the initial distribution and has not received a replacement battery since will need to bring the issued radio to the training class for a replacement battery. This will also assist in the tracking of the radios for inventory and auditing purposes.

Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings

Course #: 07719 Days: June 6 Time: 8:30 - 12:00 Fee: \$ 10.00

Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings (IRTB) class will present the historical background of terrorist organizations, the use of explosives and the various methods of terrorist groups.

The Prevention and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents class is a companion to the Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings. Students should participate in either or both classes based upon their needs.

Class presenter is Geoff Herald a Captain with 27 years with the City of Danbury Fire Department. Geoff is a member of the Hazardous Materials response team. Current certifications include these classes through the EMRTC in Socorro New Mexico, ACBIRC training at Dugway Army Proving Ground in Utah. Connecticut Fire Officer II, Instructor II, WMD Instructor Training from ODP in Anniston Alabama.

Incident Safety Officer: Fire Suppression

Managing a Changing Environment

This National Fire Academy direct delivery course covers the skills and techniques midlevel managers will need to provide leadership and direction for their departments. Content includes an overview of significant economic, social, political, and technological influences affecting fire service operations. Students will have the opportunity to identify and relate these influences to their professional and personal situations; and to practice strategies for managing changes resulting from those influences.

Course content addresses requirements of NFPA 1021 Fire Officer I in areas of assigning tasks or responsibilities to unit members at both emergency and non-emergency situations and directing unit members at a training evolution. Students will initiate action to implement a new department policy at the unit level so the policy is communicated to and understood by unit members.

ICS 300: Intermediate ICS for Expanding Incidents for Operational First Responders. This is a three day course designed with several significant course units to enable the incident managers to meet the challenges of an expanding complex incident: ICS Fundamentals Review, Unified Command, Incident/Event Assessment and Agency Guidance in Establishing Incident Objectives, Planning Process, Incident Resource Management, Demobilization, Transfer of Command, and Closeout. The course describes how the NIMS Command and Management component supports the management of expanding incidents, describes the incident/event management process for expanding incidents and supervisors as prescribed by the ICS, implements the incident management process on a simulate Type 3 incident, and illustrates the development of an Incident Action Plan for a simulate incident. Students are expected to participate in activities, exercises and to the discussion groups while developing an open attitude to the growth of ideas and concepts in ICS.

This seminar will take the guesswork out of workplace safety and health by providing specific information about the Connecticut Department of Labor, Occupational Safety and Health Division (CONN-OSHA): who they are, what they do, and what happens after they show up at your door.

John Able, CSP, CONN-OSHA Occupational Safety Training Specialist, will discuss all facets of CONN-OSHA activities. Specific items to be covered include:

- CONN-OSHA staff composition
- Most frequently cited violations
- Handling an OSHA Inspection
- Post-inspection activities
- Injury and Illness Recordkeeping Requirements
- Safety & Health Programs

The ever-changing, complex and high-risk tasks that fire departments engage in often make compliance with OSHA standards difficult. A programmed, systematic approach to safety and health will pay dividends in many ways. CONN-OSHA is dedicated to providing assistance in crafting safety and health programs designed to prevent injuries and illnesses.

Pneumatic Rescue

Course #: 07712 Days: June 5 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 40.00

This eight hour program covers the use of pneumatic air bags for rescue and hazardous materials incidents. Topics covered include: the effect of gravity on stabilizing, lifting and moving objects, cribbing, air bag systems (high, medium, and low pressure), and the use of these systems in rescue and haz-mat situations. The program starts with a classroom session and then moves out to the training grounds for practical evolutions utilizing air bags in rescue scenarios.

Positive Pressure Attack: Effects on Occupants in Residential Structures

Course #: 07081 Days: June 8 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 55.00

Presented by Training Chief Robert Nicks, Austin, TX Fire Department and DK Ezekoye Professor University of Texas at Austin

There are many debates throughout the Fire Service on the subject of Positive Pressure Ventilation (PPV). There is fairly wide spread consensus on the benefits of reduced heat and increased visibility for the advancing hose team when using PPV. However, there is heated debate in the fire service on the effects of PPV on victims or firefighters located beyond the fire. The opinions on this subject range from never use PPV period, to always use PPV, regardless of victim, firefighter, or fire location. Both opinions can't be right!

After almost losing one of our own in an apartment fire where ventilation controlled a fire, which resulted in a secondary flashover, The Austin Fire Department increased our training and research in ventilation tactics. Austin Fire Department partnered with the University of Texas at Austin and has conducted three full-scale tests on PPV. Two of the tests answer the question, “What effects does PPV have on victims or firefighters located beyond (downstream of) the fire. The third test was conducted in a turn-of-the-century hotel. This test helps to determine how large building size affects PPV efforts.

Attendees will come away from this presentation with a better understanding of what can occur when PPV is established. The importance of determining fire location, knowing how thermal conditions may change for potential victims, and how different ventilation paths can affect thermal conditions.

Chief Nicks' Bio:

Chief Nicks spent 12 years in downtown Austin working at Station One as a Firefighter, Fire Specialist, and Lieutenant in the high-rise district. As a Captain, he worked at Ladder 15, Ladder 3, and Ladder 8. When promoted to Battalion Chief, Chief Nicks worked at the Safety Office for two years. He is now the section head assigned to the Training Division. Chief Nicks has been a HOT instructor at FDIC West, has made many presentations across the State of Texas concerning the Austin Fire Department/ University of Texas PPV studies. Chief Nicks has been an FDIC Indy presenter for the last 3 years.

DK Ezekoye's Bio:

DK Ezekoye is a professor in the Mechanical Engineering Department at The University of Texas at Austin. He received a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley in 1991. Following his Ph.D., he spent one year in the Building and Fire Research Laboratory at the National Institute for Standards and Technology. He has written over 75 papers on fire, combustion, and heat transfer, and also teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in these areas.

Post Incident Reviews

Prevention and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents

Course #: 07720	Days: June 6	Time: 1:00 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 10.00
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Prevention and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents (BRSBI) is presented to provide participants sufficient knowledge of suicide bombings so they can become a part of their agency's overall prevention, deterrence, mitigation and response to this threat. The content includes types of bombing attempts, recognizing the phases of attack preparation and suggested measures agencies can employ to mitigate the risks and dangers.

The Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings class is a companion to the Prevention and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents. Students should participate in either or both classes based upon their needs.

Class presenter is Geoff Herald a Captain with 27 years with the City of Danbury Fire Department. Geoff is a member of the Hazardous Materials response team. Current certifications include these classes through the EMRTC in Socorro New Mexico, ACBIRC training at Dugway Army Proving Ground in Utah. Connecticut Fire Officer II, Instructor II, WMD Instructor Training from ODP in Anniston Alabama.

Rope Rescue Refresher

Course #: 07728	Days: June 7, 8	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 100.00
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This two day program is designed for students who have previously completed a Connecticut Fire Academy rope rescue training program. The main objective of the program is to review the procedures and operation involved in conducting a rescue using a rope system.

This program starts off with a review of the safety procedures, and the care and maintenance of rope and hardware. Following the classroom session the class will move outside to work on anchor points, patient packaging, belaying, and horizontal haul systems. The class will then cover vertical systems and victim pick-offs. The final portion of the class will challenge the student by having them perform simulated rescues utilizing rope systems.

Prerequisite: Connecticut Fire Academy Basic Rope Rescue or Rescue Technician-Rope.

The PPE requirements are rescue gloves, a protective helmet, safety glasses, and footwear.

Class hours 16

Scott Air-Pack Field Maintenance 2.2 – 4.5

Course #: 07721	Days: June 6	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 20.00
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This one day program is designed to acquaint your personnel with field maintenance of Scott 2.2/4.5 SCBA's. Major emphasis is placed upon student participation in a series of hands-on exercises under the supervision of a Scott Health and Safety technician.

Topics will include inspecting, cleaning, disinfecting, parts replacement and trouble shooting.

This class will not cover the NxG2 SCBA.

Participants will be required to bring their own 2.2 – 4.5 SCBA only. They should also bring the following tools: small flat screwdriver, number 2 phillips screwdriver, standard pliers, 1/8" pin punch, 1/2" and 5/8" open-end wrenches and 10" adjustable wrench.

Standpipe Operations

Course #: 07727	Days: June 7	Time: 8:30 - 4:30	Fee: \$ 30.00
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Whether you are in a large or small department, a 60-story hi-rise or a 2-story nursing home, standpipes are becoming more prevalent.

Standpipe operations are extremely overlooked, taken for granted and an under-trained evolution with most fire departments. Standpipes are still misunderstood.

This course will cover fatal incidents in past fires involving standpipes and how to avoid getting into dangerous situations during standpipe operations. Standpipe operation, proper equipment to use with standpipes, how to overcome problems with standpipes and duties of the members of an engine company will all be discussed. Hopefully the student will go home with a new outlook on Standpipe Operations and be able to create or modify their standpipe packs / kits and assist their department with creating their own SOGs/SOPs.

Full PPE and SCBA will be required, as practical exercises will be conducted.

Station Evaluator Training

Course #: 07718	Days: June 6	Time: 1:00 - 4:30	Fee: \$ Free
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This half-day program is designed to establish a standard testing environment for students taking certification skill evaluations. Participants will learn the criteria for being professional and effective station evaluators. Participants will also practice completing skill sheets after viewing videotaped performances.

Any instructor wishing to become a station evaluator at any state certification exam site must complete this course.

Prerequisites: Participants must be state certified as a Fire Service Instructor I. Proof must be submitted with application.

Swift Water Rescue-Awareness

This 4 hour classroom program is intended for personnel who may be first to arrive at water-related emergencies and expected to initiate the local response plan. Personnel completing this program will meet the requirements to be deployed at the Awareness level of NFPA 1670, Chapter 7 for Surface Water incidents. The identification of hazards and proper personal actions will be stressed throughout the program. Topics covered include: assessing water incidents; conducting a size-up of existing or potential conditions; identification of appropriate resources necessary to safely conduct operations; implementing the local response system for water incidents, site control and scene management; hazard recognition; controlling hazards; and determining rescue verse recovery.

Course hours: 4

The Firefighters Guide to Barn Fire Response & Emergency Horse Handling

Course #: 07735 Days: June 8 Time: 8:30 - 12:00 Fee: \$ 10.00

This half day course begins with a review of the nature of the horse and understanding the 'why' behind horse behavior. The presenter is Halide J. Caine, Certified Equine Massage Therapist who will cover information needed by the emergency responder responding to barn incidents including: the dos and don'ts of handling, catching & containing the horse; typical barn layouts, interior pens, paddocks, fences and storage hazards.

Should the emergency include a fire response time will be spent on covering what to expect, what to do, and what NOT to do during fire suppression activities in regards to the horse.

Responders may also be summoned to other equine related emergencies so the presenter will review safety tips with recommendations on how to handle a horse down, horse loose, or roadway accidents.

Class hours: 2

Truck Company Operations: Ground Ladders

Course #: 07717 Days: June 6 Time: 8:30 - 4:30 Fee: \$ 50.00

For most of our history in the Fire Service, ground ladders have been a mainstay of safe and successful structural firefighting. In recent years, with the advent of aerial devices, SCBA, advanced PPE and the decline in staffing in both career and volunteer departments, Fire Department proficiency in and use of ground ladders has tapered off, often with negative and sometimes disastrous effects on fireground operations and firefighter safety.

In this one day, combination lecture and hands-on class, students will be able to review the basics of fire service ground ladders from anatomy to commands to carries and raises. Students will renew their proficiency in carrying, deployment and use of roof ladders, 24' ladders, 35' ladders and 50' ladders. Skills covered will include entry and exit, line advancement and withdrawal, victim removal and rapid ventilation – all over ground ladders. Streetwise skills, such as throwing multiple ladders with minimal staffing, ladder shifting, heeling and climbing will also be covered.

Students should be prepared for a physically challenging day of carries, raises and climbing. Students should have a level of comfort with ladders and working from varying heights. Students should be certified to Firefighter I and bring full PPE with SCBA.


