

3. Statutory authority for intervenor request:





**Questions to Siting Council:**

- 1) There is some question to the validity of the rationale for Eversource's claim that the need for this substation from an increase in demand will be urgent by 2017. Has there been an independent review of the statistics supporting any increases in demand from the Town of Greenwich? There are numerous sources indicating that the Town is neither increasing in population nor businesses. In fact, there are many indicators that show just the opposite.
- 2) What are the sources and the statistics driving this urgent need? Both the Bureau of Economic Analysis and the Census Bureau show statistics to the contrary. In fact, there is a predication that the need for utilities will drop off dramatically in 2016 as two major businesses exit Stamford, CT.
- 3) Has anyone reviewed the longevity of this capital investment versus new, more environmentally friendly methods for supply, and if so, why hasn't this technology been presented for review?
