


## CORNWALL, CT VETERANS' MEMORIALS



Cornwall's veterans' memorials are situated on the Village Green directly across the street from the Town Hall. There are two, and each has two bronze plaques mounted on rough-cut vertical granite slabs listing the names of those who served: CORNWALL HONOR ROLL, 1914 WORLD WAR 1918; CORNWALL HONOR ROLL, 1941 WORLD WAR II 1945, and, KOREA, June 27, 1950 – January 31, 1955; VIETNAM, August 5, 1963 – May 7, 1975.

The names are listed in alphabetical order in raised lettering. Small flags are placed at the front of the stones. On Memorial Day, the town parade and observances take place near the memorials on the Green, which is located on Pine Street, just off Route 4 in Cornwall.



A monument to honor Civil War Major General John Sedgwick stands near the General's home at the junction of Route 43 and Hautboy Hill Road in Cornwall. A large granite upright commemorates the General's dedication to service as Commander of the 6<sup>th</sup> Corps, Army of the Potomac, lists the Mexican

and Civil War battles in which he led his men, and supports a bronze medallion showing his profile encircled by a wreath. A period howitzer and cannon balls form the base of the monument, which was dedicated by a large gathering of veterans and dignitaries on Memorial Day 1900. A Centennial Observance was held in 1964, and in 1994 restoration of the medallion was recognized in a memorial ceremony.
