

## LEBANON, CT VETERANS MEMORIALS

All memorials are located on the North Lawn of the Town Hall at 579 Exeter Road.



The Flag Pole Monument was erected in 1923 and was the first war memorial in town. On one of the bronze plaques is a composite of three soldiers each representing a different war; the American Revolution, the Civil War and World War I. The Monument Symbolizes Lebanon's Honor and Respect for those who had served up to that time.

The Honor Roll lists the names of all soldiers who served from Lebanon in WWI and WWII and was erected after WWII. The town erected an honor roll (no longer around) that listed the names of the first draft in front of the old town hall in September 1942.



A Monument to honor veterans of other conflicts since WWII from 1946 through 2002; Korea, Vietnam, Lebanon, Granada, Panama, the Persian Gulf, Somalia, Haiti, Bosnia and Afghanistan, was dedicated on November 11, 2002 at the Post Home of The American Legion Post 180 then moved to its present location in May 2003.
