

LISBON, CT VETERANS MEMORIALS

The town of Lisbon, Connecticut, the most southerly community on eastern Connecticut's Scenic-Byway, has three memorials commemorating the men and women who served their country during war.



Memorials honoring Revolutionary War veterans and another honoring all vets are situated on the town hall lawn.



The third is an "honor roll" memorial located on the Newent Congregation Church lawn on the easterly side of South Burnham Highway. Erected in 1931, the honor roll lists the "The Men of Lisbon Who Served Their Country In the World War, 1917-1918." Although the participants in the war-to-end-all-wars may fade into history, these men are still connected to our community by way of their descendants and by the roads and places that bear their names. Their surnames attest to a community of diverse ancestry, whose citizens rallied to serve and sacrifice for their country as one.



All three sites are located in the center of town at the intersection of Routes 169 and 138. Parking is available at the Lisbon Town Hall or the John Bishop House Museum, directly across the street from the Honor Roll memorial.
