

MARLBOROUGH, CT VETERAN'S MEMORIALS

Marlborough has four sites with monuments honoring veterans.



Site one is located at the American Legion Post # 197 on Route 66. This is a bulletin type board constructed by Post members which lists the names of Marlborough veterans who served in wars from the French and Indian War, Civil War, WWI, WWII, Korean War and Vietnam War.

Site two (right) is a plaque mounted on stone located on the site of the former Marlborough Town Hall (corner of Route 66 and North Main Street). The inscription honors all veterans of Marlborough from our Charter date 1803.



Site three (left) is a grave site at the Marlborough Cemetery, located between Route 66 and School Street. The site is best accessed from School Street. This site is notably where our Memorial Day Parade begins. A brief ceremony of flowers presentation, firing squad salute and taps is the prelude to our parade. Although there is no burial at this site, it is beautifully decorated and maintained throughout the summer.

Site four is presently located in front of Town Hall on North Main Street. This monument is scheduled to be moved to a location on North Main Street as a renovation of our Town Green. This monument was designed and constructed under the direction of American Legion Post # 197 member William Nystrom.
