

TOWN OF WOODSTOCK VETERAN'S MONUMENTS



Two stone monuments dedicated to the veterans of Woodstock are located by the flagpole at the southern end of the Town Common on Route 169

The first and largest of them is one erected by the Town of Woodstock in 1919. It is a three-sided boulder on the front of which is positioned a bronze plaque that states, "In

honor of those who served their country in its struggles for liberty, justice, and humanity," listing the conflicts of the nation from the Revolution through World War I. Another plaque on the near, east-facing side lists all the men and women who participated in World War II. A similar plaque is on the west-facing side identifying all the "soldier and sailor boys" of the Town involved in WWI.

The south face holds a smaller bronze marker sited adjacent to the first. Here are listed all those from Woodstock who served during the Korean conflict. Added names are those who, in later years, had been missing from the original posting for that period. The obverse of this monument has a bronze plate on which is listed all who served during the Vietnam War.
