THE NATIONAL ORGANIC PROGRAM

The National Organic Program (USDA/NOP) develops, implements and administers national production, handling and labeling standards for organic agricultural products. The USDA/NOP also accredits the certifying agents who inspect organic production and handling operations to certify that they meet USDA standards.

Since the early 2000's Connecticut is one of only 15 states to receive cost-share funding to reimburse producers for the cost of organic certification. Each producer may be reimbursed for up to 75 percent of their organic certification cost, not to exceed \$750. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture works with about 35-40 Connecticut organic growers each year on the cost-share program. NOTABLE TREES TOUR OF NORTHEASTERN CONNECTICUT

Tree Bus Tour: October 17, 9 am – 4:30 pm

About the Tour - The Hartford Cooperative Extension Council will host a Notable Trees Tour Saturday, October 17, 2009. The bus will depart at 9:00 am and return at around 4:30 p.m. to our Windsor, CT starting point. The tour offers participants the chance to witness and learn about magnificent and notable trees of northeastern Connecticut during the peak of autumn's splendor. We will have access to two private homes with numerous notable and champion trees, as well as stops in Pomfret, UConn Storrs Campus, and Woodstock. Leaders for the tree tour will be Ed Richardson and John Kehoe, both widely recognized as leading, local authorities on rare and important trees.

Notable Trees - Notable trees satisfy criteria having to do with height, circumference of the trunk and spread of the canopy. Established in 1985, the Notable Trees Project collects and distributes information about Connecticut's largest and most historic trees, both native and introduced. The volunteer project is sponsored by the Connecticut Botanical Society, Connecticut College Arboretum and the Connecticut Urban Forest Council. Many of the trees on the tour are not only unique but are located on private property and are not normally accessible to the public. Educational Opportunity - A free, optional classroom session will be held Wednesday October 14 for all those who purchase a tour ticket. This

evening class will be held at the West Hartford UConn campus. Topics will include: notable/champion tree characteristics, wellness care and stewardship for mature trees, and techniques for tree identification. Instructors will be the tour guides and UConn educators.

The cost of the class and tour, including lunch from Congress Rotisserie, is \$65 per person for registrations received prior to September 15, and \$70 thereafter. Proceeds from this educational event will go to support the Hartford County Cooperative Extension, the educational outreach of the University of Connecticut, College of Agriculture and Natural Resources. A portion of the registration fee is tax deductible and a receipt will be provided the day of the tour.

About the Extension Council - The Council is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing funds for various UConn Cooperative Extension programs, including food and nutrition, food safety, lead paint remediation, urban gardens, pesticide safety, the Master Gardener Program, 4-H, and urban forestry. FROM CHICKEN FEATHERS TO FLOWER POTS

Chicken feathers, usually an unwanted byproduct of poultry processing, may have a more valuable future as an ingredient in biodegradable flower pots, according to an Agricultural Research Service (ARS) scientist.

Chemist Walter Schmidt, in the ARS Environmental Management and Byproduct Utilization Laboratory in Beltsville, Md., has been developing practical uses for discarded chicken feathers. Each year, approximately 4 billion pounds of chicken feathers are left over after processing in the United States.

Working with the Horticultural Research Institute (HRI) in Washington, DC, Schmidt and HRI research associate Masud Huda have formulated planting pots that degrade over variable periods of time, ranging from one to five years.

The pots look and feel like any other plastic planters encountered at your local nursery, but they are made to disintegrate naturally, without harm to the environment. In fact, the pots--manufactured without any petroleum components--would slowly release beneficial nitrogen to the soil.

In 2002, Schmidt and Justin Barone, a former ARS research associate, found feather-derived plastic could be molded just like any other plastic and has properties very similar to plastics such as polyethylene and polypropylene. This makes the feather-derived plastic a unique material for packaging or any other application where high strength and biodegradability are desired, according to Schmidt. In 2006, the process of making composites and films from feather keratin was patented by ARS.

Schmidt and Huda are now working to develop fully biodegradable flowerpots. Several commercial pot manufacturers are involved in this phase to determine optimum production-scale molding specifications for the containers. According to Schmidt, the "green" horticultural end products will not only help solve the environmental problem by creating biodegradable plastics, but will also provide a cost-effective commercial use for feathers.
