DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE AUCTIONING HORSES SEIZED IN EAST HAMPTON ANIMAL-CRUELTY INVESTIGATION

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture today began auctioning 32 horses seized in February as part of an animal-cruelty investigation at an East Hampton breeding facility.

The auction of the Friesian, Andulsian and Gypsy Vanner horses will help pay for costs incurred through caring for them and other animals at the department's Large Animal Rehabilitation Facility.

Located at a state correctional complex in Niantic, the facility is home to the Second Chance program, a collaboration between the Dept. of Agriculture and the Dept. of Correction through which inmates volunteer to work with the animals in partnership with agency personnel.

Care of the animals in Niantic is partly paid by donations to the State Animal Abuse Cost Recovery Account, which will receive all proceeds from this auction.

Please visit the department's website, CTGrown.gov, to view photographs of the horses, access biographical information on each animal, and to download a sealed-bid application questionnaire.

All bids must be received by the close of business on June

1, 2016. The horses were seized from Fairy Tail Equine on Feb. 2 after an investigation that found the owners of the facility failed to provide proper food, water, veterinary care and shelter to the animals, despite the efforts of state animal control officers to allow them to voluntarily improve the animals' treatment.

Agriculture Commissioner Steven K. Reviczky said the auction will help defray more than \$50,000 in animal-care expenses the department has incurred since the seizure.

"Our first responsibility in this case was to ensure that the animals were given proper care and rehabilitated back to health," Reviczky said. "But we also have an obligation to the taxpayers of Connecticut to try to recoup costs associated with these types of cases whenever possible, and that is what we want to accomplish through this auction."

Reviczky noted, however, that he reserves the right to reject any bid, including those that may be the highest bid on a particular horse.

That flexibility will allow the department to ensure that the horses are re-homed with new owners who are properly prepared to care for them.

The department has received many dozens of inquiries from around the country and Canada by those wishing to obtain one of the horses.

The bid application questionnaire contains more than a dozen questions concerning the bidder's suitability to care for a horse, including their experience with these specific breeds and whether their property and facilities are adequate.

The department will review applications at the conclusion of bidding on June 1, and successful bidders will be notified individually to arrange for transfer of the animals.

Fairy Tail Equine owners Thomas and Melanie Olajos were each charged with 35 counts of cruelty to animals - 32 counts for each of the horses seized and the other three counts stemming from the alleged mistreatment of two dogs, 19 rabbits and 78 chickens removed from their property.

According to the warrant used to secure the Olajos' arrest, an examination of each horse by an equine veterinarian after they were removed from Fairy Tail Equine found that "the herd as a whole had been neglected and was underweight."

The veterinarian's findings indicate that the horses had been neglected in a variety of ways, including nutrition, care of their hooves and teeth, grooming and wound care.

In addition to being underweight, many of the horses had active lice infestation, their manes and tails were matted and tangled, and many had a skin condition known as dermatitis.

The couple voluntarily transferred custody of the animals to the department last month, and their cases are pending in Superior Court.

The dogs and rabbits have been placed in new homes through adoption, and the chickens were sold to buyers who made a donation to the State Animal Abuse Cost Recovery Account.

RESPONSES TO USDA 2015 LOCAL FOOD MARKETING PRACTICES SURVEY DUE MAY 2

Questionnaires sent to more than 800 Connecticut producers as part of the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service 2015 Local Food Marketing Practices Survey must be returned by May 2.

The survey, mailed to producers earlier this month, seeks benchmark data on the number of farmers using and value of sales flowing through different local marketing channels such as farm stands and CSAs, as well as sales to a retailer such as a restaurant, grocery store, or an institutions.



The USDA contacted approximately 44,300 people across the country, most who reported they sold directly to consumers or retailers on the 2012 Census of Agriculture.

The survey provides the first opportunity for NASS to contact many individuals and entities specifically involved in local foods. Producers' responses will provide important, detailed, objective information to meet the growing need for national, regional and state-level estimates on the local foods sector.
