APCP PREPARES FOR LOW-INCOME PET STERILIZATION PROGRAM

The Department of Agriculture (DAG) is pleased to announce that the second year of the APCP Low-Income Spay/Neuter program is scheduled to start some time later this summer. This service is part of the agency's Animal Population Control Program (APCP), which provides vaccination and sterilization vouchers for the pets of low-income CT citizens. The program is the result of the 2007 passage of Public Act No. 07-105; titled An Act Concerning the Expansion of the Animal Population Control Program. The Act allows the agency to set aside up to 10% of its income for approved residents, which is expected to be between \$50,000 and \$60,000 annually.

To participate, Connecticut residents must complete a Low-Income Pet Sterilization Application and must be on one of six low-income programs as outlined by the Department of Social Services (DSS). Applications are available through the APCP office, town halls, veterinary practices, local housing authorities and from the DSS. Approved individuals will be eligible to receive up to two (2) vouchers per household per year for owned unaltered cats or dogs. Benefits provide for two vaccinations and the sterilization of the pet. Vaccines are coincidental with sterilization and will not be given alone.

The APCP has provided vaccination/sterilization benefits to more than 60,000 municipal pound pets, feral cats and low-income owner's pets since the program's inception in 1995. NOTE: The start of this program is contingent on the passage of a state budget. At the time this article went to print, the State of Connecticut had still not passed a budget for FY 2010.

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES) invites you to attend Plant Science Day 2009. This annual event is held at Lockwood Farm, a 75-acre research farm in Hamden, CT. It features a day of plant science open to the public. This event is free and open to all.

Among the highlights of the day are the Century Farm Award and the Samuel W. Johnson Memorial Lecture. The Farm Award is presented to a

farm that has been in family operation for more than 100 years. This year's recipient will be announced on the day of the event. The Memorial Lecture, named for Professor Johnson, director of the Station from 1877 to 1900, was established as a forum to discuss issues of concern to Connecticut residents and the Station. This year's lecture, "Saving our Wild Areas, One Yard at a Time," will be presented by Ms. Margery Winters, Senior Educator, Roaring Brook Nature Center, Canton, CT. Additional short presentations by CAES scientists will address the "Asian Longhorned Beetle: A Threat to our Forests," "Honeybees and American Foulbrood," "Weather Monitoring, Pathogen Biology, and Disease Management for Winegrapes in Connecticut," and "Detection and Control of Bedbugs." Technical demonstrations include "How to Identify Asian Longhorned Beetle" and "Gardening with Containers." The Plant Science Day program offers something-for-everyone, from novice gardeners to professionals to environmentalists, and includes many opportunities for attendees to discuss many topics of plant science on an informal basis with CAES scientists at their research plots. There will also be Barn Displays about some of the Station's research programs, over 90 field plots and exhibits, as well as walking tours and activities for children, such as the "Passport for Kids." Experts will be available to answer questions on plant identification and disease diagnosis, soil testing, and weed and insect identification.

Media are invited for on-site interviews with CAES scientists about their research projects and other services and programs at the Experiment Station.

18-R. FARM LAND RENTAL FIGURES NEEDED

If you are a landowner renting farmland to a farmer or are a farmer renting land from a landowner your assistance is urgently needed. In the next month, you will be receiving a Land Use Value Survey questionnaire in the mail from the Connecticut Farm Bureau Association.

The Connecticut General Statutes requires the CT Department of Agriculture to compile revised recommended farmland use assessment values every five years for the PA 490 Land Use Assessment Program. The PA 490 program allows farm, forest and open space lands to be assessed at their current use value rather than fair market or potential highest and best use value. In order to compile these values, a large sampling of land rental data on land that is being rented by farmers and used for production agriculture needs to be collected and analyzed.

This is where you, the farmer comes in. It is imperative that these surveys are completed accurately and returned to Connecticut Farm Bureau as soon as possible. This rental data will be compiled and used to help calculate recommended farmland use values for PA 490 assessment purposes for the next five years.

MILKWEED: FROM FLOSS TO FUN IN THE SUN

Milkweed is a favorite food of monarch butterfly caterpillars, which also store the plant's poisons for protection from birds and other predators. Farmers haven't always looked kindly upon milkweed, though. That's because large numbers of these plants can creep into farmers' fields, competing with crops for water, sunlight, and nutrients.

But some farmers today are changing their minds. Now, rather than getting rid of milkweed, the farmers actually grow it as a crop. They've learned that milkweed's soft, silky floss (fibers) can be used to stuff pillows, comforters and jacket linings.

But floss isn't the only usable portion of this native American plant. Oil from its flat orange seeds can also be turned into ingredients for natural sunscreens, says Rogers Harry-O'kuru. He's a chemist with the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) in Peoria, Illinois.

Harry-O'kuru has been experimenting with sunscreen formulas containing oil from common milkweed. Its scientific name is *Asclepias syriaca*, and it grows throughout much of the United States.

Harry-O'kuru examined the milkweed oil's fats and waxes and decided they would make great starter ingredients for not only sunscreens, but also cosmetics, moisturizers, conditioners, and other skin- and hair-care products.

Many of today's sunscreens use chemical absorbers or blocks to protect our skin from two kinds of ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun: UV-A and UV-B.

Harm caused by UV-B radiation is temporary, like the sunburn a careless beachgoer might get while on vacation. UV-B radiation causes long-term harm, such as early aging of skin and skin cancers. Lifeguards, construction crews and others who spend a lot of time outdoors are at greatest risk.

Harry-O'kuru's milkweed-oil formula uses natural ingredients called antioxidants [pronounced ANT-ee-OX-eee-dunts]. The antioxidants soak up the sun's harmful rays before they reach our skin. In laboratory tests, the

antioxidants in the formula blocked UV rays as well as certain rub-on sunscreens now sold.

Harry-O'kuru hopes milkweed-oil-based sunscreens will be more Earth-friendly, too, thanks to their fats and waxes, which rapidly break down in the environment.

Besides sunscreen lotions, the milkweed-oil formula may also be useful ingredients in epoxies, paints, and other industrial products.

If farmers change their mind about milkweed, maybe industry will, too. "Right now," says Harry-O'kuru, "we're hoping a commercial partner will become interested in developing the technology further."
