Wednesday, October 1, 2008**NOTES from the DEPARTMENT . . .****RHODE ISLAND'S FIRST MOBILE PROCESSING UNIT**

With all the questions in the last few years regarding the processing and slaughtering of farm animals in CT, I wanted to make a visit to our neighboring state and visit a farm that had tackled the problem head on—and won!! (at least a partial victory). So, I took advantage of a tour of Casey Farm which was offered through the efforts of the Connecticut Farmer Learner Group.

Casey Farm in North Kingstown, RI is a 300 acre, 300 year old farm that is owned by Historic New England. This mid 18th-century home-stead, overlooking Narragansett Bay, was the center of a plantation that produced food for local and foreign markets. Located near Newport, Casey Farm had access to material goods imported from England, enabling its early owners to live in a fashionable manner.

Prosperity ended with the burning of Newport during the Revolution, and the farm settled into a pattern of absentee ownership. Starting in the mid 19th century, the Casey family began to improve the farm. They leased the property to tenant farmers but retained two rooms in the house for their own occasional summer use, as they had come to regard the farm as their ancestral home

The farm raises beef, goats, turkeys, chickens hogs and grows vegetables and fruit. It has an organic Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) from June thru October and also runs a Farmers Market each Saturday morning. Educational school tours are featured along with various summer camp programs.

Pat McNiff is the enterprising young manager of the farm, and it was his idea to construct a mobile processing unit (MPU) for poultry (broiler chickens and turkeys) in order to sell the birds to consumers on the farm and at Farmers Markets. He used no grants or loans for this venture, the only financial resources being his own out of pocket money. Through the determined efforts of the Rhode Island Division of Agriculture and its Chief Ken Ayars, an agreement was reached thru a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the state Health Department that provides the Division with inspection authority relating to the MPU. The license for the MPU is issued by the Rhode Island Department of Health with the assurance that any animal welfare and disease control issues are addressed by the Division of Agriculture. This takes some of the burden from the Health Department and creates a smoother transition in the farmer-state contact. Pat worked tirelessly on the unit in conjunction with health department and division officials until a MPU was built with specs that satisfied both. The MPU consists of a “dirty area” and a

“clean area”. The dirty area consists of the kill area, the scalding tank and plucking machine that can process 4-6 birds at a time. They go into the clean room where they are immediately placed in a chill tank before the actual evisceration and processing occurs. Chipped ice is used for their chill tanks. Processing is done once a month and takes about 9 hours to process 250-300 birds. 6-8 workers take part in this one day affair and the cost per bird to process is approximately \$2.65. Offal is placed at the on farm compost pile and all parts of the birds are used except for the gizzards.

This MPU came to fruition in Rhode Island due to the cooperation of two state agencies and the diligent efforts of a working farm manager who pushed for this venture to be successful. It will take a greater effort in Connecticut since jurisdiction for any type of slaughterhouse in our state runs the gamut of local, state and federal agencies that include the local health districts, the State Health Department, the CT Department of Consumer Protection, the CT Department of Agriculture, the CT Department of Environmental Protection, and the United States Department of Agriculture. When this many entities are involved in decision-making processes, it can take time to get through the process. Since the price of processing is expensive enough to our farmers without the added costs of shipping their animals to an out of state facility in order to get the job done, the one item that all are in agreement on is that a decision must be made in the near future. More and more farms are producing livestock on a small scale and these animals must be processed in a timely and economically feasible manner.
