NOTES from the DEPARTMENT . . .

EXCELLENT REPRESENTATION OF CT COMPANIES AT THE 2009 NATURAL PRODUCTS EXPO EAST

Nearly 30 Connecticut companies exhibited at the 2009 Natural Products Expo East in Boston, MA September 23-26. Exhibitors ranged from specialty food companies to pharmaceuticals and earth friendly packaging. Each company had a focus on being made with natural or organic products. 21,000 industry members, including retailers, journalists, and entrepreneurs, explored more than 1500 booths over three days.

Prior to the start of the show, Food Export Northeast held the Natural Products Expo East Buyers Mission. Twelve buyers from ten different counties ranging from Canada to Hong Kong came to Boston and met with 33 companies from throughout the country. One on one meeting between the buyers and companies lasting up to 20 minutes allowed for detailed discussion about the companies products. After two full days of meeting, with 270 meetings taking place, \$1.4 million worth of US products was sold internationally as a result of the one on one meetings.

Food Export Northeast is a non-profit organization that promotes the export of food and agricultural products from the northeast region of the United States. The organization was first created in 1973 as a cooperative effort between 10 northeastern state agricultural promotion agencies and the United States Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS). Food Export, in conjunction with its member states, provides a wide range of cost-sharing services to facilitate trade between local food companies and importers around the world. These services include: export promotion, customized export assistance, and a cost-share funding program. - Tour of Boulder Knoll Community Farm in Cheshire - about 14 miles north of the Experiment Station. Boulder Knoll just started its Community Supported Agriculture Program this year, and also had an educational/work experience program this summer with 36 low income teenagers from Waterbury.

USDA SEEKS APPLICATIONS FOR VALUE-ADDED PRODUCER GRANTS

USDA Rural Development State Director, Jay Healy has announced that USDA is accepting applications for grants to assist agricultural producers seeking to add value to the commodities they produce. About \$18 million will be awarded nationwide.

USDA plans to award planning grants of up to \$100,000 and working capital grants of up to \$300,000 to successful applicants. Applicants are encouraged to propose projects that use existing agricultural products in non-traditional ways or merge agricultural products with technology in creative ways. Businesses of all sizes may apply, but priority will be given to operators of small and medium-sized family farms – those with average,

annual gross sales of less than \$700,000. The competitive grants to be awarded under this notice are part of USDA Rural Development's annual budget and are not funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

Applicants must provide matching funds equal to the amount of the grant requested. Ten percent of the funding being made available is reserved for beginning farmers or ranchers and socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers. An additional 10 percent is reserved for projects involving local and regional supply networks that link independent producers with businesses and cooperatives that market value-added products.
