- Provide home visiting services, funding and training to support families raising young children to ensure the children’s health, well-being and positive growth and development and to prevent child abuse or neglect.

PA 14-41

(effective July 1,2014)

Provides 10 years of funding for:

- **Capital Improvements**

- not to exceed \$75,000 per classroom
- renovation of an existing public school space
- one-time funding
- available in year 1 or 2

- **Operations**

- \$5,000 per child (up to 15 children funded)
- up to \$75,000 per classroom /\$300,000 annually

Conditions for Funding

- Unmet need for preK for 3 and 4 year olds
- Local or regional board of education must serve as grantee
- Renovations in public schools only -- NO new construction
- Classrooms may be located in a public school or with an *early childhood provider (*eligible for operations funds only)
- Program must be Head Start, NAEYC accredited or able to become accredited within 3 years (unaccredited programs subject to interim quality measure)
- Proportion of children with an IEP per class = K-12



Conditions for Funding

- Class size 18
- Collaborative efforts to provide services for children when school not in session
- Prioritize children with special needs and DLL
- Certified teacher (112, 113, 001, 002, 003, 008, 065) employed by the BOE
- Renovated space to be used for Smart Start
- Must serve **additional** children beyond current preK enrollment
- Letter of support from SR Council

Opportunities for Collaboration

- Partner with community early childhood programs to provide alternative care when school is not in session
- Share professional learning
- Access to comprehensive services
- Transportation
- Increase awareness of community resources
- Increase resource and referral for needed services
- Partner with community early childhood programs for space



Priorities

Points will be awarded for districts that

- Offer full-day kindergarten for all eligible children
- Allocate 60% of spaces to children 75% of state median income or 50% of the spaces to children who qualify for free and reduced price lunches
- Demonstrate the greatest need for preK services
- Have (or develop a plan to create) a cohesive preK-3rd grade continuum

Determined by CHEFA assessment

Tuition/Family Fee

- A family fee MAY be charged according to OEC Sliding Fee Scale (Appendix F)
- If a family fee is charged families are able to apply for Care4Kids childcare subsidies
- If a family fee is not charged then the child is able to be counted for ECS

Care4Kids

- Provides low to moderate income families a subsidy to pay for child care costs.
- Parents must be working or in an approved Jobs First Employment Services (JFES) education or training activity.
- Parents apply through Care4Kids at the United Way of Connecticut.
- Families must complete an Application Form and Parent Provider Agreement Form (PPA)
- Providers receive reimbursement according to regional reimbursement amount available at <http://www.ctcare4kids.com/>
- Electronic monthly invoice & payment
